MAYOR AND COUNCIL HAVE SERVED WELL CITY OF EUGENE

The annual message of Mayor Matlock is printed in full in today's Guard. It is a comprehensive document, dealing with the affairs of the city in a business-like manner, and showing a thorough knowledge of existing conditions, as well as of the needs of the future. Most important of all, it proves that we have an executive who is devoting much of his time to the city and giving to the public service the benefit of a thoroughly trained business mind. The message should be carefully read by every resident of Eugene, in order that all may become better acquainted with the affairs of the city. In saying this we do not agree with all the recommendations made by his honor, but we do give him credit for sincerity and honesty in his acts and recommendations.

Eugene is passing through a period of transition from the country town into a real city, with a broader, more expensive scheme of government, and this fact alone calls for clear-headed businessmen at the head of its affairs. They must be alive to the changing conditions, and broad enough to meet them, yet withal conservative to the extent of taking no radical action that would plunge the city into indebtedness beyond its power to meet the obligations. Furthermore, the likelihood that the city will take over the water system and make costly extensions and improvements that the necessities of the municipality demand greatly increases the responsibility of the mayor and council. And in this connection the Guard will say unhesitatingly and without reserve that it believes the city was never better served by public officials than it has been during the past year. In the face of a bitter factional fight they have gone steadily ahead, carrying out antecedent pledges to the people, and pushing forward a program of public improvement that has already made Eugene a city of marked importance in the Northwest. Several good men have just retired from the council, but there is every reason to believe that the men who succeed them are equally well fitted for their duties and that another two years of wise city government may be confidently looked forward to—years of progress and improvement unparalleled in our history.

CITY SHOULD BUY PRESENT WATER PLANT

The Guard believes that the voters of Eugene should declare in favor of the purchase of the Willamette Valley Company's water plant at the coming special election. It may be that the price is too high, considering its actual cost and the condition of some of the mains, but it will mean immediate municipal ownership and assure an income while extensions and improvements are under way. It will also give the city the ownership of real estate worth many thousands of dollars and rapidly increasing in value. It will eliminate future competition, opposition and possible litigation, and in this respect save the city a vast sum of money and no end of trouble and tedious delay.

The city seems propitious for getting together on this vexed question and settling it right for all time to come. The municipal ownership advocates will have the satisfaction of knowing that they have won their fight on a principle, and the Willamette Valley Company will receive full compensation for their investment. Better than all, the growing city of Eugene should within another year be supplied with pure water direct from mountain sources.

- 1. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, providing for the amendment of sections 108 and 112 of the city charter. The ballot title of this measure states the purpose of the act to be to strike out authority to issue \$100,000 of electric light bonds and \$75,000 of gas light bonds, and to increase the issuable water bonds from \$100,000 to \$300,000, fix the character and manner of issuing such bonds and the distribution of water revenues, authorize condemnation proceedings in building water plant, provide for a water board and fix its duties.
2. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, to amend the city charter by adding a new section, 135, providing for the prohibition of burials within the city limits.
3. Proposition to purchase for the sum of \$140,000 the water plant and property of the Willamette Valley Company according to the offer of said company filed in the office of the city recorder March 21st, 1908.
