EUGENE DRESSES UP FOR GREAT MUSICAL FESTIVAL

NUMEROUS FLAGS AND PENNANTS ADORN WILLAMETTE STREET IN HONOR OF THE OCCASION—CHICAGO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA ARRIVES ON AFTERNOON TRAIN

Eugene is in gala attire today in honor of the musical festival which begins at the University of Oregon tonight. Early this forenoon Willamette street was bedecked with national flags and different colored pennants, the flags being strung on the cross wires for the trolley line and the pennants flying from the light poles at regular intervals. They present a striking appearance and give the city a holiday appearance. This work is under the direction of the Commercial Club, and the flags were purchased by the club. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra arrived from Portland on the afternoon train in their special cars. They were accompanied by the soloists who are to take part in the concert tonight, tomorrow afternoon and tomorrow night. The sale of seats for the concert has been large and it is expected that the great auditorium in Villard Hall will be filled at each performance. The chorus of 150 voices, under the direction of Professor L. M. Glen, dean of music at the University, promises to be the best ever heard here. They have practiced diligently for weeks and those who have heard the rehearsals during the past week say the chorus will be the best of its kind ever heard in the state outside of Portland.
