FIRST CONCERT OF MUSICAL FESTIVAL GREAT SUCCESS

The first concert of the Eugene Music Festival was a magnificent success.

Director Rosenhecker is very quiet and dignified, and does not resort to any of the physical directions used by some directors for a cue. The men are perfectly under his control and follow him implicitly. The overture, "Der Freischutz," Wagner, one of the most popular of orchestra favorites, was given with fine shading and a most effective effect. It might be expected in the afternoon concert, where the orchestra will be the principal feature. The encore was the "Melody in F," Rubenstein, and the careful interpretation given the rendition of the composition which is played by every student of music, was as astonishing as it was beautiful.

The vocal quartet was very fine. Without any disparagement to any of the four, the contralto and bass were the most popular. The duet for soprano and alto, "They shall Hunger No More," was beautifully rendered, with excellent feeling and the blending of the parts, although at the first it seemed there would be some difference as to the volume of the respective voices.

Miss Wilson was especially happy in the obituary to the ladies chorus. The high A flat was taken clear and strong and maintained with perfect ease.

Mrs. Gannon sang in true soprano spirit in all her numbers, her best solo performance being "Come Ye Blessed." She has the advantage of being the possessor of the pure cantabile, the voice of all others which appeals to the heart of humanity.

Mr. Miller's voice is delightful in the high notes, has a fine quality and is used with excellent judgment. Mr. Middleton, in "A New Heaven and New Earth," simply astonished his audience and perhaps made the climax of the evening on the words, "I saw the Lord sitting up on a throne, high and lifted up, and His train filled the temple." This was sung with full fortissimo, with accompaniment of trumpets and was marvellous in power and volume.

When Prof. Glen came on the stage there was a ripple of applause which started in the chorus and grew louder in the orchestra and was tremendous when the large audience took it up, showing a genuine appreciation of his work as a director. A member of the orchestra pronounced him the best local director they have had.

The principal thing with an audience is not how long the chorus has drilled, but how do they sing; not in justice to both chorus and director but it is said that the results were far beyond anticipations, considering the time they have been in training. The large body of over a hundred and fifty voices was in excellent trim and with the added inspiration of the brilliantly lighted stage, the more than ordinarily appreciative audience and the foundation of the superb orchestra, they sang grandly.

The first number went with precision and nice attack but in the fine fortissimos of "This is the Kingdom" and "Great and Marvelous are Thy Works" and the double chorus, the volume and spirit were inspiring. The semi-chorus, "The Fining Pot is for Silver," was sung with the most refined delicacy of expression and shading by the twenty-five or thirty voices to whom it was assigned. And it would be hard to find a body of singers anywhere who could do it as well. The audience demanded an encore and when the singers rose in response and the orchestra gave the chord it was found that they had kept the pitch exactly, though unaccompanied.

"It may be," he said in conclusion, "that this great mistake is due to the fact that a collier which is as essential to the efficiency of the navy as a battleship is not so attractive, does not involve the expenditure of so much money and does not afford the opportunity for the same profitable display upon the ocean or at the summer resorts along the coast, and for that reason we have made the mistake of building a navy that looks, in order to make its way from one ocean to another, is obliged to rely upon the vessels belonging to other nations."

SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the city of Eugene, Saturday, April 18th, 1908, at which the following propositions will be submitted to the legal voters of the city for approval or rejection:

1. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, providing for the amendment of sections 198 and 112 of the city charter. The ballot title of this measure states the purpose of the act to be to strike out authority to issue \$100,000 of electric light bonds and \$75,000 of gas light bonds and to increase the issuable water bonds from \$100,000 to \$300,000, fix the character and manner of issuing such bonds and the distribution of water revenues, authorize condemnation proceedings in building water plant, provide for a water board and fix its duties.

2. An initiative bill filed in the office of the city recorder January 4, 1908, to amend the city charter by adding a new section, 135, providing for the prohibition of burials within the city limits.

3. Proposition to purchase for the sum of \$140,000 the water plant and property of the Willamette Valley Company according to the offer of said company filed in the office of the city recorder March 21st, 1908.

THIRD WARD—Sherman Heller, R. S. Bryson and William G. Martin; Bryson and Martin designated as clerks. Polling place, Heller's shop, 41 West Seventh street.

FOURTH WARD—D. E. Yoran, G. E. Hard and S. P. Ness; Hard and Ness designated as clerks. Polling place, Wilkins building, 65 West Eighth street.

Polls to be opened at 8 o'clock a. m. and closed at 7 p. m. on April 18th day of April, 1908.
