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WINTER ENDORSER TAFT'S CANDIDACY

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PRIMARY ELECTION BEING HELD THIS AFTERNOON

The primary election is being held this afternoon throughout the county. In Eugene the vote is light and it is presumed that it is correspondingly light in the country precincts.

The vote in the several Eugene precincts up to 3:30 o'clock this afternoon was as follows:

South Eugene No. 1, 114 Republicans and 14 Democrats; South Eugene No. 2, 85 Republicans and 18 Democrats; North Eugene No. 1, 90 Republicans and 17 Democrats;

AN ADDRESS TO VOTERS OF EUGENE

To the Voters of Eugene:—While the water supply question seems to absorb all the interest and the energy of the voters, it may be necessary to call your attention to the other charter amendment to be voted upon Saturday.

Citizens, do not lose sight of the importance of the matter, intended to prevent further encroachments of emeteries upon the expansion of our town.

Private and corporation interests cannot count, if the health of Eugene will be endangered more. It is a scientific and hygienic fact that cemeteries and apt to contaminate water for a great distance, a German authority speaking of a radius of fully two miles.

These assertions are made impartially, without any point whatever against any corporation or individual. The greatest good to the greatest number must be the motto and doing of a real moral and civilized community.

Thus it ought to be the duty of every citizen to vote against the extension of cemeteries and thus for the amendment of the charter.
