### BATTLESHIP FLEET WILL START NORTH

San Diego, April 17.—The stay of the battleship fleet in San Diego waters will end tomorrow morning, when the sixteen battleships will hoist anchors at 6 o'clock and steam northward, the next visiting place being the port of Los Angeles.

The junior officers will give a ball at the Hotel del Coronado tonight and a band concert will wind up the gaieties marking the four days of the fleet's visit. At midnight a farewell salute of thirteen aerial bombs will be fired from Point Loma, followed by a flight of thirteen giant rockets and thirteen redfire illuminations.

### SOUTHERN REPUBLICS AGAIN SHOW UNREST

San Francisco, April 17.—The Bulletin says the political unrest on the south coast has caused the issuance of secret orders to Commander Mayo of the cruiser Albany to prepare at once for a three months' cruise. His destination is said to be LaUnion, Salvador. It is the talk in naval circles that the Albany will carry envoys south for the purpose of making some permanent peace arrangements between the republics.

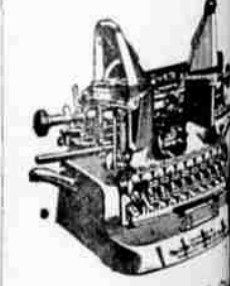
