BEGIN WORK ON  
LONG TRESTLE  
FOR TROLLEY LINE

L. N. RONEY RECEIVES HIS CONTRACT FROM PORTLAND, EUGENE & EASTERN RAILWAY

WILL COMMENCE WORK AT JUDKINS' POINT IN FEW DAYS—OVER FOUR THOUSAND FEET OF TRESTLE BETWEEN POINT AND WILLAMETTE RIVER AT SPRINGFIELD

L. N. Roney yesterday received from the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company the contract for building the trestle work for the Eugene-Springfield trolley line along the bottom from Judkins' Point east to the Willamette river at Springfield. He went to the head of the Springfield mill and today to look at one of the Booth-Kelly Company's donkey engines there with a view of securing one with which to operate his pile driver, and if any of them suit him he will move it at once to Judkins' Point, where the work will begin. The hammer for the pile driver has been delivered, and the machine will be rigged up at once. There will be practically 4000 feet of trestle work on the line along the bottom, divided into seven stretches, with short fills between them. The longest stretch will be over 1200 feet. Over 100,000 feet of lumber and over 1000 piles will be used in the construction of the trestle.

The first stretch of trestle, 690 feet long, beginning at the point, will be finished up first and the track laid on it so that the materials for the fill and the next trestle may be hauled on cars over the completed track. The contract requires that the work of building the trestle shall be kept ahead of the track construction work, and Mr. Roney thinks he will be able to almost finish the entire job before the track layers reach the trestle. If they go no faster than they are at present, it is probable, however, that the company will soon put on a large force of men and complete the track to the point in a short time. The Springfield bridge. Mr. Roney, who has the contract for building the bridge across the Willamette at Springfield, says he will not commence on that structure until the trestle is completed. Materials for its construction can then be hauled over the track on cars, greatly facilitating the work.

KILLED HIMSELF

Crazed with responsibility because he had been jilted by his betrothed, Custer Dinwiddie, of Gold Hill, yesterday morning at 2:15 sent the charge of a shotgun crashing through his head while lying in bed beside his sleeping brother, Willard Dinwiddie, at his home four and a half miles east of Mt. Angel.

Drawing the gun up under the covers along side of him, he placed the muzzle against the upper part of the chin and pulled the trigger with his thumb or finger, the charge going up through the head and coming out of the right temple and lodging in the opposite wall and door, splattering brains. Besides the two brothers, Mrs. Willard Dinwiddie and a lady friend were in the room.

Startled out of their slumbers by the shot, the women screamed, and to add to the confusion it was some time before Willard could find a match to light the lamp which stood on an adjoining chair. But it needed no light to show what had happened. The gurgling of the blood from the gaping wound in the throat of the suicide told the terror-stricken trio that a terrible tragedy had been enacted.—Salem Statesman.

BOY KILLED BY TRAIN AT SALEM

Kirk Barr, a sixteen-year-old boy, whose parents reside at Turner, was run over and instantly killed by the Cottage Grove local at the Southern Pacific passenger depot about 9:30 last night. The boy was trying to board the train while it was in motion, lost his hold and fell under the wheels. The body was badly mangled and the head almost severed from the body.—Salem Statesman.
