LEGISLATURE IS CLOSE ON STATEMENT NO. 1

Election of four or five Democrats in addition to the Statement No. 1 Republican nominees would give the legislature wholly to the control of the Statement No. 1 forces. Pledged to Statement No. 1 are 22 Republican nominees and nine or ten hold-over state senators. This total of 42 or 43 almost reaches the 46 votes needed in the legislature to elect a United States senator.

Democrats are now surveying the state to see where they have a good chance of defeating anti-Statement No. 1 Republican nominees for the legislature. Such nominees, if elected, would not vote for Chamberlain for United States senator even though he were the "people's choice." At the June election, since he is a Democrat. Hence Chamberlain's followers want as many of them defeated as possible. Chamberlain's followers are jubilant over the prospect of his defeating H. M. Cake, the Republican nominee. They say they see not so many obstacles toward beating Cake as in securing a Statement No. 1 majority of the legislature and in holding the Republican members of that majority to their pledge.

SENATOR FULTON ACCEPTS RESULTS OF PRIMARIES

Senator Fulton was at his office this morning and many of his friends called to offer congratulations as well as regrets, says the Astoria Budget. As a matter of fact it was a matter of pride and satisfaction to him to have his old friends with him and he was as cheerful as ever with his usually happy smile and infectious laugh. When asked what he had to say to the readers of the Budget about the election he dictated the following: "The returns so far as received indicate that I have lost out. A defeated candidate naturally casts about for a reason as far as possible impersonal to himself. Hence my judgment as to the cause is of little practical value, but I give it for whatsoever it may be worth. Members of opposition parties largely registered as Republicans and voted against me. If the final result shall confirm present indications, I will cheerfully accept the verdict of the people and return to private life, seek to do my duty as a citizen just as I have endeavored to discharge my duties as an official. To my friends throughout the state who have so loyally stood by me I cannot express my gratitude. The high compliment paid me by the people of my home county in voting for me so nearly unanimously will remain throughout my life a most pleasing memory. The knowledge that one has the confidence of his neighbors and friends is, after all, the most precious possession obtainable in this life. Hence, even in defeat, I shall be well content with the assurance of that confidence which the vote in Clatsop gave me."
