### BOURNE PLEASED WITH RESULT OF OREGON PRIMARIES

Washington, April 20.—When asked if he had anything to say regarding the result of the Oregon primary elections, Senator Bourne said: "Yes; I am deeply gratified, although in no manner surprised, at the overwhelming victory which Statement No. 1 advocates have won in Oregon. I trust its opponents will realize that the principle has come to stay. I did my utmost to assist the enforcement of that principle. I took no hand whatever in the contest, for reasons stated in my interview, given your own and other Portland dailies some weeks ago. Senator Fulton's and my own relations have been, to me at least, extremely pleasant, and friendly, and I trust will continue so. I hope and expect that Senator Calk's relations and my own will be equally pleasant."

Senator Bourne joined with Representatives Hawley and Ellis today in recommending the appointment of William H. Leitner postmaster at Huntington. Bourne was host at dinner last evening, his guests being Senators Aldrich, Hemenway, Curtis and Secretary Metcalf.

### KAY WILL VOTE FOR PEOPLE'S CHOICE

Senator Tom Kay will probably ratify the people's choice for United States senator whether he be Republican or Democrat, says the Salem Journal. This will help give the Statement No. 1 faction in the next legislature the additional supporters necessary to be able to name the people's choice to be United States senator.

Senator Kay also believes that Hemenway's recent speeches were responsible for the defeat of Fulton in Marion county. Speaking to a Journal reporter Sunday morning, Senator Kay stated:

"I believe that Fulton would have received a majority in this county but for the speeches of Francis J. Hemenway. I cannot say by just what majority would have won, as in any event the result would have been close.

"I would support Calk if he receives the popular vote in the June election and would probably vote for Chamberlain were he to receive the people's choice.

"As to this, however, I am not fully decided. I believe a great many Democrats registered as Republicans and voted against Fulton and for Calk, especially in the cities."

### SENATOR FULTON TAKES DEFEAT EASY

Senator Fulton arrived in Portland last night from Astoria and will leave tomorrow morning for Washington to see what can be done to save the Fulton amendment to the interstate commerce law, which is now in the hands of Senator Elkins and his conferees of the senate committee on interstate commerce, says the Portland Journal.

"Have you anything to say about the primary election?" Senator Fulton was asked.

"Well, what do you expect me to say?" replied the senator, grimly. Simply this: "Oh, hell!"

Then he chuckled and told the story.

"I saw it in an old book called 'Flash Times in Mississippi.' A case was being tried in one of the backwoods counties. The evidence began piling up for the plaintiff and he thought it looked like a sure case, until the court announced, 'Gentlemen of the jury, I must instruct you to disregard the evidence and return a verdict for the defendant.' The plaintiff turned away his head and exclaimed 'Oh, hell!'"

Blames the Democrats.

"But, seriously, my defeat was undoubtedly brought about by the Democrats, as I have said before. They registered in large numbers as Republicans and voted for Calk. The majority of the Republicans of this state were undoubtedly in favor of my candidacy. There should be a law passed requiring first that all those voting at the primaries shall take affidavit that they are bona fide members of the party under which they register, and second, they should be compelled to prove that they had candidates at the last election."

When asked as to Mr. Calk's chances for election, Senator Fulton said:

"Mr. Calk most certainly will be elected. This is a Republican state and Republicans will vote for the Republican candidate. This talk about Governor Chamberlain's securing the senatorship is all bosh."

### ANOTHER GOOD BASE BALL GAME

### AMUSEMENTS

The Barnum & Bailey circus played an extended engagement at Madison Square Garden, New York City, this spring.

The Ringling Brothers Circus began their season at the Coliseum, Chicago. It is reported that their business was very large.

The greater Norris and Rowe circus, museum, menagerie, hippodrome and congress of nations, began their season in San Francisco this year. In thirty days the big show played to 279,873 paid admissions. The press of the city were enthusiastic in their praise of the new big show.

By arrangement of the three big circuses, each of them opened their season in the metropolis of the various sections of the country that they will play. Barnum & Bailey circus will play the New England states; the Ringling Bros., the middle west and Southern States, and the greater Norris and Rowe circus the territory west of the rockies.

Thus each section of the country will have one of the big shows this year.

It is estimated that with the three big circuses of the country, the Ringling Bros., the Greater Norris and Rowe, and Barnum & Bailey shows, that there are 1300 people, 1000 horses, 100 elephants, 175 cars, besides hundreds of other animals used.

It costs about \$12,000 a day to operate these shows. They are about of equal size and importance this year.

It is estimated that the distance covered by the three big shows this season will exceed in the aggregate 45,000 miles. Each show will travel on three special trains, it is said.

The Greater Norris & Rowe Circus will exhibit at Eugene Saturday, May 2nd.

### IMPORTANT LAND DEPARTMENT RULING

The General Land Office at Washington, D. C., recently rendered a decision in the case of Mendenhall vs. Taylor, which is of considerable interest to parties holding homestead claims.

Waldo Taylor of Silver Lake, Oregon, placed a homestead filing on a piece of timbered land in 1903. The 160 acres would cut perhaps 3,000,000 feet or more of merchantable yellow pine lumber. He built a cabin on the place and in a technical sense complied with the homestead law. About a year ago W. W. Mendenhall of Klamath Falls, Ore., filed a contest, alleging abandonment of land and noncultivation. The registrar and receiver of land office at Lakeview, Oregon, held antagonistic opinions, the former deciding for the plaintiff, the latter for the defendant. The General Land Office, on appeal sustained the registrar, and the decision clearly stated that the homesteader must make substantial improvements, must establish a residence and maintain the same, must cultivate the land, not an acre or two but a considerable acreage, and must be able to prove when it comes to a contest that the land has been the entryman's home, permanently, not occasionally, if he desires to make sure of his claim.

In view of the fact that the law is so strict regarding homesteads many of the entrymen who filed homesteads last fall, when the large area of timber land was restored to settlement and entry, are relinquishing their homestead entries and immediately placing timber and stone filings on the same.
