MAYOR ISSUES PROCLAMATION ON ELECTION

COUNCIL MEETS IN ADJOURNED SESSION LAST NIGHT, AT WHICH SEVERAL IMPORTANT MATTERS ARE ACTED UPON—ORDINANCE DEFINING POWERS OF FIRE CHIEF AND OTHERS

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last night with a full board present. The report of the canvassing board for the special election last Saturday was read and placed on file. Mayor Matlock read the following proclamation, which was adopted:

Whereas, there was submitted to the people of the city of Eugene, Oregon, at a special election for that purpose on the 18th day of April, 1908, an initiative proposal after being ordained by the Common Council, pursuant to and in accordance with the general laws of the state of Oregon, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the charter of said city, and whereas there was at the same time submitted to the people of said city for their approval or rejection an initiative proposal to amend the charter of said city by adding a section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto within the city, or the burial of human bodies therein, except under certain conditions, and

Whereas, the votes cast at said election having been this 20th day of April, 1908, duly canvassed and determined and the said amendment of said sections 108 and 112 as aforesaid having carried by an affirmative vote of 667 as against 171 negative votes thereon.

Now, therefore, I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor, do hereby proclaim, announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast for and against said proposed amendments are as stated above, and that said amendments received an affirmative majority of all votes cast and that said proposed amendments, from the date hereof, be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the city of Eugene, and a part of the charter of said city.

That said proposed amendment of the charter by adding an additional section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto failed to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon and

thereby failed to become a law of said city or a part of the charter thereof.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this 20th day of April, 1908, and caused the seal of said city to be hereunto affixed.

Other matters to come up before the meeting were as follows: The plat of the Huddleston extended addition to Eugene was presented and adopted and an ordinance approving the addition passed. The plat of Walnut Park addition was presented, but referred back to the owners for slight correction.

The annual reports of the recorder and treasurer, upon motion of Councilman Williams, were referred to the finance committee to be audited.

Street Matters. The street committee was instructed to put in a cement walk in front of the Cyclone hose house on East Eleventh street.

The matter of the extension of a street from the corner of the University campus north to the mill race was referred to the street committee with power to act.

The request of J. C. McElroy for using a breeding stable near the S. P. right-of-way, just opposite the friendly warehouse, was granted.

An ordinance establishing the grade of West Seventh street from Blair to the western limits of the city, also an ordinance for the improvement of the same by grading and graveling, were passed.

A petition remonstrating against the change of the car line from Alder street to A street, signed by a number of persons interested, was placed on file.

A Street Roller. A representative of the Buffalo-Pitts Engine Company was present at the meeting and addressed the council on the matter of the purchase of a ten-ton steam roller for the city's streets, to cost \$3500. The matter was referred to the street committee for investigation.

The fire and water committee and the chief of the fire department were instructed to prepare an ordinance defining the powers and duties of the fire and water committee, of the chief, driver and of all the officers of the fire companies. This is the result of the recent trouble between the fire and water committee and Driver Croner.

LOS ANGELES DECLARES HOLIDAY TO VISIT FLEET

Los Angeles, April 21.—By order of Mayor Harper this is a general holiday in honor of the visit of the Atlantic fleet. Thousands visited the beach and went on board the battleships.

A feature of today's program in Los Angeles was an automobile parade of 25 machines carrying sixty officers of the fleet and officers of the army, together with state and municipal officers.

The men of the fleet were entertained yesterday at the chutes and Wild West show, nearly four thousand men being given shore liberty. The same program will be carried out tomorrow and the succeeding days until every sailor of the fleet has been entertained.

CARS RUNNING AGAIN IN CHESTER

Chester, Pa., April 21.—Carrying no passengers, cars manned by double crews of non-union men are running today on all the city lines. The cars are not accompanied by the state police, as the strikers and their sympathizers are not molesting them. The strikers have buses in operation.

FORTY-THREE BODIES FROM WRECK DEBRIS

Melbourne, April 21.—Forty-two bodies have been recovered from the wreck caused by the collision on April 19 of two trains from Ballarat and Bendigo to Braybrook Junction, eight miles from Melbourne. It is believed that several others are in the debris. The coaches caught fire and many were burned to death.

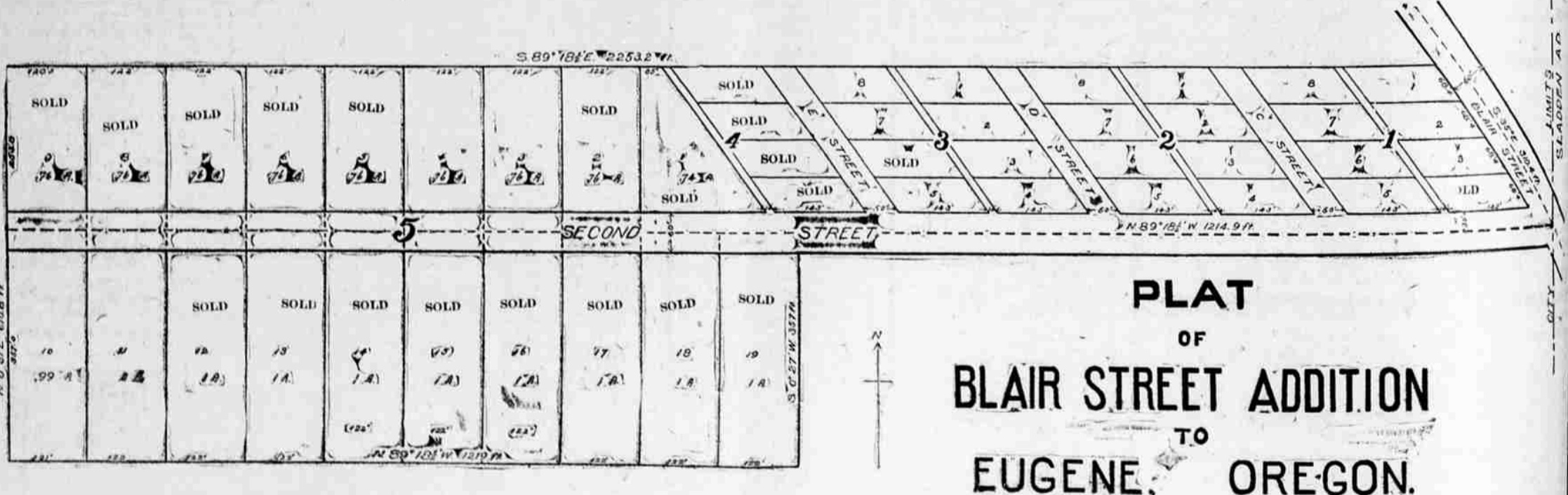
