BANKERS' ATTORNEY OUTLINES DEFENSE

Salem, Or., April 21.—Immediately upon the convening of court this morning in the trial of J. Thoburn Ross, Attorney Wallace McCamant plunged into the argument upon which the defense evidently has based its entire case.

McCamant cited authority to substantiate his contention, that when the state treasurer deposited the school funds in the bank he became a debtor of the bank and not a bailor; that the bank was the creditor of Mr. Steel and not a bailor. In order to make this contention stand Mr. McCamant also undertook to show that by the decisions of the supreme court of Oregon the state treasurer is authorized to deposit the funds in a bank.

called by Judge Pipes, who concluded the examination of the witnesses, but Mr. Steel being absent from the courtroom, Ben Oloit, expert accountant and custodian of the books of the bank, was placed on the stand. He was released and Mr. Steel appeared in court. When the treasurer was asked to testify that he had deposited funds in the defunct bank the defense objected, the jury was excused and the argument of Mr. McCamant was begun, which lasted throughout the morning session and well into the afternoon.

INTEREST CENTRES IN REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

Republican interest is now directed toward selection of the Oregon delegates to the National Republican convention in Chicago, June 16, in the state and congressional district conventions, to be held in Portland May 14. The Oregon delegates will be eight in number, four chosen by the state convention to represent the state at large and two by each district convention to represent its respective district.

REPUBLICANS SET DATE FOR CONVENTION

The Republican county central committee met yesterday afternoon and appointed a committee to exercise any and all powers conferred by law upon the county central committee as follows: J. M. Williams, R. A. Jayne, W. S. Moon, D. A. Paine, and H. V. Belknap.

It was decided that the delegates to the state and district convention be selected by a convention to consist of delegates from the various precincts, the county central committee to be ex-officio a delegate and additional delegates to be selected, one for each 25 votes cast at the republican primary election of April 17, 1908, or major fraction thereof.

It was further decided that the executive committee be empowered to select committeemen in the various precincts where none have been elected, the precinct committee meeting for that purpose to be held on May 2.

Saturday, May 9, was the time set for holding the county convention to select delegates to the state convention.

W. C. T. U. CONVENTION HELD AT HALSEY

Halsey, Or., April 20.—A joint institute of the Women's Christian Temperance Unions of Lane and Lane counties was held in the Halsey M. E. church April 15 and 16, during which time about 40 delegates attended from the two counties.

Addresses of welcome were delivered by Mayor D. S. McWilliams in behalf of the city; by Rev. Geo. Clark, pastor of the M. E. church, in behalf of the churches, and by Miss Ida Maxwell, in behalf of the local W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Eva C. Wheeler, president of the Lane county W. C. T. U., responded, after which Mrs. Henrietta Brown, state president, gave the principal address of the evening. The papers read during the institute were all of a high order.

The last evening was devoted to a silver medal contest, in which eight boys and girls, between the ages of 16 and 20, took part. The contestants were from Brownsville, Albany and Eugene. The medal was awarded to Ransom A. Mackie, a student of the Divinity College, of Eugene.

FLORENCE BOSBY MYSTERY IS DEEPER

Portland, April 21.—If 18-year-old Mrs. Florence Bosby, who is claimed by J. G. Covell of the Nortonia hotel as his wife of three months, really committed suicide last Sunday as she threatened to do in a letter to her mother, the best efforts of Detectives Inskeep and Hawley of the local police force have not availed to locate her body or any clue to her whereabouts.

Today, the mystery of her disappearance is as impenetrable as ever. The police are baffled. The missing girl's mother is in hysterics.

Covell still continues his attitude in unbelief in the suicide theory. He exhibits a marriage license dated Seattle and issued in January which records his marriage to Mrs. Bosby. Mrs. E. H. Bennett, the girl's mother, declares the certificate forged and states that Covell to have been married to her daughter Saturday night. It is hinted that the girl died rather than marry Covell, but that the latter scouted this theory.

Today, he put his case in the hands of a local detective agency. He wants to locate the woman he claims as his wife as he states he just paid her \$175 to buy Easter finery with. When she was 15 years of age the missing woman was married to Bosby with whom she lived a year.

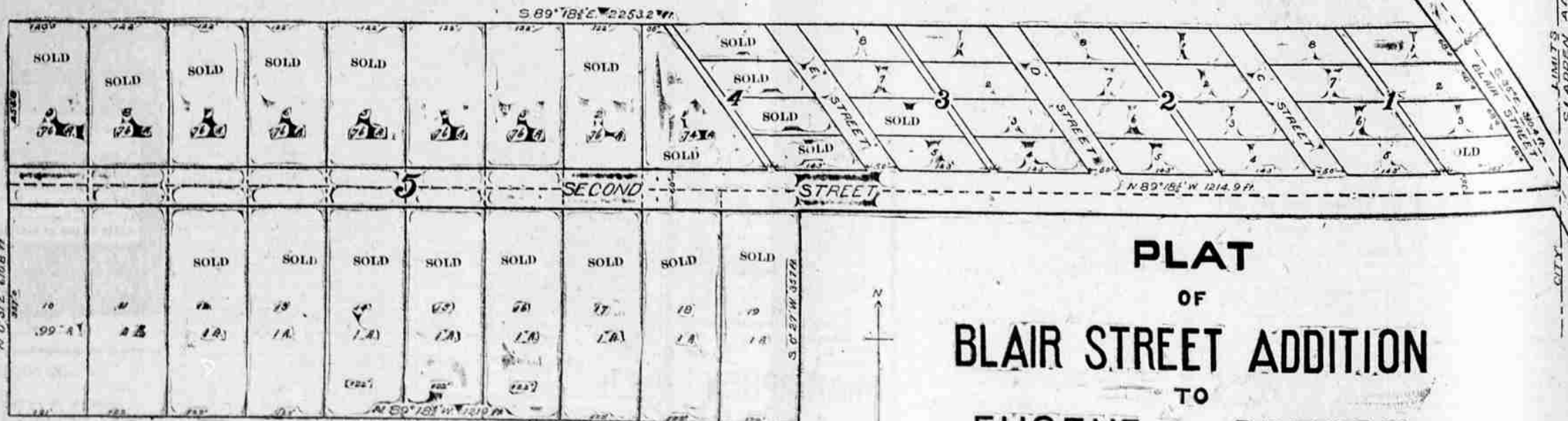
