WARREN WILL ARRANGE ANOTHER STATE FAIR EXHIBIT

COMMITTEE APPOINTS HIM AGAIN THIS YEAR—WILL BEGIN EARLY AND EXPECTS TO LAND FIRST PRIZE FOR COUNTY EXHIBIT—PART OF COUNTY FAIR DISPLAY WILL BE SENT

At a recent session of the county commissioners' court G. W. Griffin, E. O. Potter and W. M. Green were appointed as a committee to arrange for a Lane county exhibit at the state fair at Salem next September. The committee has appointed E. M. Warren to go on the exhibit and arrange it in the pavilion, and he has already begun to interest the farmers in the matter. It will be remembered that last year Lane county won second prize and a hard try will be made this year for first. Many unprejudiced outsiders were of the opinion that last year's Lane county display should have been given first, but a college professor from somewhere in Washington gave it to them without giving Lane's more than a cursory glance.

Mr. Warren thinks that by beginning early this year he will be able to get up an exhibit that cannot be touched by any other county. The best of the products on display at the Lane county fair, which will be held here the week before the state fair is held, will be taken to the lot.

BOURNE STILL HARPS ON THIRD TERM STRING

Washington, D. C., April 21.—In Senator Bourne and his "second objective term" a hole, it is asserted, something in the man and the issue? Is he talking just to hear his own conversation, or is he stilled with second sight?

Is he merely a self-advertiser, or is he the apostle of a political gospel that the Republican party will have to accept before the close of June? These are questions that half the politicians in the capital are asking of the orator 50 per cent. What is the answer? For the most part those who talk about the senator from Oregon are prone to laugh good naturedly at his insistence that Roosevelt is bound to be nominated again in spite of himself and to remark that "it is just another hobby" that the senator is riding. If he were not worth two or three million dollars, Bourne would probably be called a "crank."

Despite the magnificent imported cigars that he forces upon his hearers in reckless profusion, the political gossip about town are inclined to make for shelter whenever they see the Oregonian coming. They know that if he once gets hold of their coat lapels he will talk them dead, dumb and blind and paralyzed on Roosevelt. How anyone on earth can consider the possibility of a Republican candidate other than the president himself, Bourne cannot understand.

In the face of all the amusement that members of congress and newspaper writers have been getting out of Bourne and his hard ridden hobby, there's no denying the fact that within the last few months he has won a great many followers. An odd feature of the case, also, is that the whole country seems to have taken turns—or spasms—at following his lead. Perhaps every three or four weeks, the papers in various parts of the United States will be filled with articles forecasting Roosevelt's renomination and reelection. Within a few days the Roosevelt spasm appears to fade away and the followers of Taft are leading.

SERIOUS FIRE OCCURS AT ASTORIA

The box factory and the sash and door factory of the Seaside Lumber company were destroyed by fire this afternoon and the mill seriously damaged but to what extent cannot be told at this hour. For a time all of the mill buildings were on fire and seemed doomed and at the height of the fire the entire city of Seaside was threatened but at last accounts the fire was under control and no further danger is feared, although a strong wind is blowing toward the city. Before the fire had reached its height Mayor Hennessey of Seaside telephoned Mayor Wise for assistance and he immediately directed Chief Foster to send down as much hose as he could spare.—Astoria Budget.
