of a cigar to the billboards advertising it; but journalistic advertising gets results, and no less surely when the display is a part of the reading matter than when it is in the paid advertising columns.

"A review of the professor's article makes these comments:
"In concluding Professor Thomas dwells for a moment on the reverse side of the picture. Of course, he concedes, the yellow Journal has its good points, as well as its bad. Like the hunters of Kentucky in the old song, it is "half a horse and half an alligator." It is as good as its peculiar readers want it to be, and one may find jewels amidst its rubbish. Professor Thomas thinks that at the bottom it is ashamed of itself, and points out that "even now its editorial pages are denying its sensational features." Is it possible, he asks, that it is beginning to aid in its own reformation, and that like Sir Condy Rackrent in Miss Edgeworth's story, it may even survive its own wake and assist in its own obsequies?"

"I can well understand that the daily newspaper is for the most part hastily made up; that its news and oftentimes its editorial columns are prepared under the pressure of urgency, which precludes full consideration, but these conditions furnish no warrant for unjust attacks upon individuals or individuals. American Journalism must purge itself of the malice influences within its ranks if it is to be true to its splendid traditions and its high mission. No man should be condemned upon insinuation; no man should be held guilty until his case is all in; and above all, the fair name of woman must not be sullied to swell the receipts of a countingroom or furnish copy for every cheap scribbler of gossip.

"We can find no fault with honest and intelligent criticism. Just criticism is a conservator of public rights. No man is fit for public office but will welcome it and profit by it; but the criticism that is inspired by sinister motives and has no other foundation, that represents merely the effort to weaken or discredit a personal or political opponent without regard to the public interest, that seeks the ruin of reputations that its author may profit peculiarly or otherwise, is deplorable and despicable, not alone because of its demoralizing effects upon the public mind.

"There is no higher mission than that of the press. Its criticism, if fair and just, holds us to a strict accountability. It can be the bulwark and support of honest government. It can be the disseminator of genuine public intelligence. Along with its news it can carry the message of

DERBY-JEFFREY RACE STILL IN DOUBT

Eastern Oregon returns make the fight extremely close between Andrew Jackson Derby and John A. Jeffrey for the Democratic nomination for congress from the second district.

Returns from Baker, Clatsop, Gilliam, Malheur, Morrow, Umatilla and Wasco counties, for the most part incomplete, give Derby a lead of 279 votes over Jeffrey, who leads in Multnomah county. The Multnomah county returns have not yet been canvassed, and until that is done it will not be known how much Jeffrey's lead is in this county.

Friends of both men are claiming the victory. Jeffrey's friends contend that their man will have 500 votes to spare in Multnomah county, but argue that Derby will run far ahead of his competitor in the other counties. What returns have been received justify this contention. It is believed that the complete returns from the entire district will bring the margin down to a very narrow one, if it does not put Derby in the lead and thus give him the nomination.

Washington, April 23.—Late today Senator Piles, of Washington, introduced an amendment to the naval appropriation bill increasing the number of battleships from two to four.

By agreement the amendment went over until tomorrow.

MINER PROPERTY SELLS FOR THREE THOUSAND

The E. B. Miner residence property at the corner of West Sixth and Washington streets was sold today to J. N. Cole and Mitchell & Garrett for \$3000. The land consists of a quarter block, Mr. Cole getting the north half and Garrett & Mitchell the south half.

Garrett & Mitchell have sold to Fred L. Drew and Elmer T. Smith a lot owned by Mrs. Julia Jacobs at the corner of Cheshire and Washington streets. The purchasers, who are employees of the Eugene Lumber Co. will build on the lots some time in the future.

The price paid for the property is not given out for publication.

STREET CARS IDLE FOR SEVERAL HOURS

One of the fields on the generator that furnishes electric power for the street cars burned out this forenoon about 10 o'clock, and the cars were stopped. The company wired to Albany for a new one and it arrived on the afternoon train. The cars were started again about 3 o'clock this afternoon. Many people missed them and some were inconvenienced by their being idle, but the accident was unavoidable.

BOLD ROBBERY OF HOT SPRINGS RESORT

Hot Springs, Ark., April 23.—Four masked men with leveled revolvers forced the visitors at the Indiana Club today to line up while they looted the place. It is estimated they got between \$5000 and \$10,000, after which they locked the visitors in a room and escaped.

STAGE COMPANY SUED FOR \$61,000

Portland, April 23.—C. W. Maynard, of Olympia and Chehalis, former state treasurer of Washington, filed suit against the Umpqua River Steam Navigation Company, of Gardiner, Oregon, for \$61,000 personal damages in the United States circuit court this morning on the grounds that he had been severely injured and crippled as the result of a stage coach accident near Scottsburg, Oregon, in March last year.

Mr. Maynard alleges that the use of his left arm has been injured permanently as the result of a broken collar bone, and that he has suffered ever since the accident. The stage went over an embankment, this being due to the carelessness of the driver, says the plaintiff. For six weeks afterward Mr. Maynard says he was confined in the North Pacific sanatorium in Portland. He says also that he has been sick and disabled ever since the accident.

He was on his way to Marshfield, having taken the stage at Drain. W. F. Jewett is president of the company owning the stage, and O. B. Hinsdale secretary and treasurer.
