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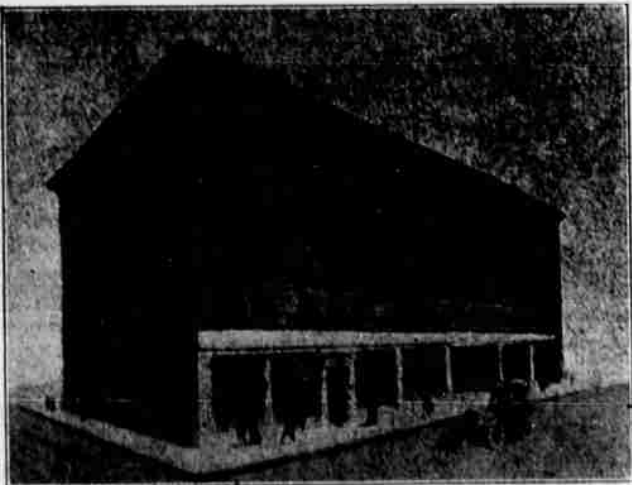

## LYNCH MURDERER IN MINNG TOWN

Rholite, Nev., April 22.—Joe Simpson, who killed James Arnold on Sunday, was lynched at Skidoo, Cal., last night. A small band of citizens overpowered the sheriff's guard and hanged the prisoner to a telegraph pole.

Simpson was a gambler and was hanged to the cross-arm pole to which he was bound Sunday, after he made his attempt on the life of Cashier Dobbs, of the Southern California bank at Skidoo. He bore an unsavory reputation and was intoxicated and after threatening vented when it meets in Chicago. Dobbs shot and killed Arnold in the most cold-blooded manner.

Arnold was a butcher and heavily interested in mines. As justice of the peace he had been instrumental in prosecuting Simpson on several occasions.

The lynchings are greatly applauded.

## ABOLISH MERRY WIDOW HATS IN CHURCH

Burlington, N. J., April 22.—Several local churches have proposed a ban upon Merry Widow hats in the congregation during the services. Laymen declare that men are becoming fewer at the services as the number of big hats increase, and that the popular style threatens to make many male backsliders.

Churches in some of the more crowded churches were at their wits' end to seat their Easter congregation. Pews which have comfortably accommodated six persons would hold no more than four when the quartet wore large hats.

In the prominent churches here it is proposed to request women who wear their big hats to church to check them at the cloakroom during the service.

## BANKER HAINES WAS BADLY DEFEATED

Hillsboro, Or., April 23.—The canvass of the vote for this county was completed yesterday afternoon and shows Haines to have a majority of 114. Hawley gets 1450 and Bean 1299. Bailey has a lead of 329 over Reid. For Railroad Commissioner, Carter has 621, Campbell 620, and Robertson 206. Tongue, for Prosecuting Attorney, has 1367. For joint senator, Barrett received 1255, Nolan 192, and Hammerly 139; for senator from this county, Wood 141, Fisher 505, Haines 345. On representative ticket, R. H. Greer has 822, Charles Hines 857 and S. A. D. Meek 712. The largest vote received by any candidate was 1484 for Willis Ireland, for recorder.

## ROOSEVELT AND FAIRBANKS SAYS YOUNG

Medford, Or., April 21.—Roosevelt and Fairbanks will be nominated by the national Republican convention when it meets in Chicago, said John C. Young, of Baker City, private secretary to Jonathan Bourne, who spent the day in Medford on a mission of secrecy, presumably looking after Bourne's interests and feeling the public pulse.

"It is the field against Taft," continued Mr. Young, "and the field will win. Taft will not have over 350 votes. When it is seen, after the first few ballots, that Taft cannot win, Indiana will lead the break to Roosevelt. Nebraska will follow and there will soon be a stampede. Indiana will lead the break because Fairbanks is willing to remain vice-president if he cannot be president. The bolt will be with the understanding that he is again named. Heminway cannot be re-elected without Fairbanks' aid, and the program will be agreeable to both him and Beveridge.

"Oregon is a long way from the center of things. You don't know what's going on. The stories of the president calling Bourne down for urging his reelection are not true." "What will Roosevelt say?" Well, he can't say anything; if the people want him, what can he say?"

## STILL ENTERTAINING MEN OF BIG FLEET

Los Angeles, April 23.—A perfect day followed the storm of yesterday and the numerous events planned for the entertainment of the fleet were held under delightful conditions. The principal feature of the day was the automobile parade, for 250 officers with more than 75 machines in line. The automobiles arrived at Pasadena at noon, where luncheon was served by the Pasadena committee.

## Return to Santa Barbara

Santa Barbara, April 20.—In confirmation of the reports that the Atlantic fleet will return here after the review at San Francisco, an advertisement has been inserted in a local paper by the war department asking for bids for supplies, to be opened here May 12. It is assumed they will be taken on board the warships shortly afterward.

Senator Bourne has introduced a bill establishing four customs collection districts in Oregon: First, Coos Bay; second, Yaquina; third, Astoria; fourth, Portland. The Yaquina salary is \$1000, and fees not to aggregate more than \$1500.

## PROCLAMATION

Whereas, there was submitted to the people of the city of Eugene, Oregon, at a special election for that purpose on the 18th day of April, 1908, an initiative proposal after being ordained by the Common Council, pursuant to and in accordance with the general laws of the state of Oregon, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the charter of said city, and whereas there was at the same time submitted to the people of said city for their approval or rejection an initiative proposal to amend the charter of said city by adding a section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto within the city, or the burial of human bodies therein, except under certain conditions, and

Whereas, the votes cast at said election having been this 20th day of April, 1908, duly canvassed and determined and the said amendment of said sections 108 and 112 as aforesaid having carried by an affirmative vote of 667 as against 171 negative votes thereon.

Now, therefore, I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor, do hereby proclaim, announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast for and against said proposed amendments are as stated above, and that said amendments received an affirmative majority of all votes cast and that said proposed amendments, from the date hereof, be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the city of Eugene, and a part of the charter of said city.

That said proposed amendment of the charter by adding an additional section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto failed to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon and thereby failed to become a law of said city or a part of the charter thereof.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this 20th day of April, 1908, and caused the seal of said city to be hereunto affixed.
