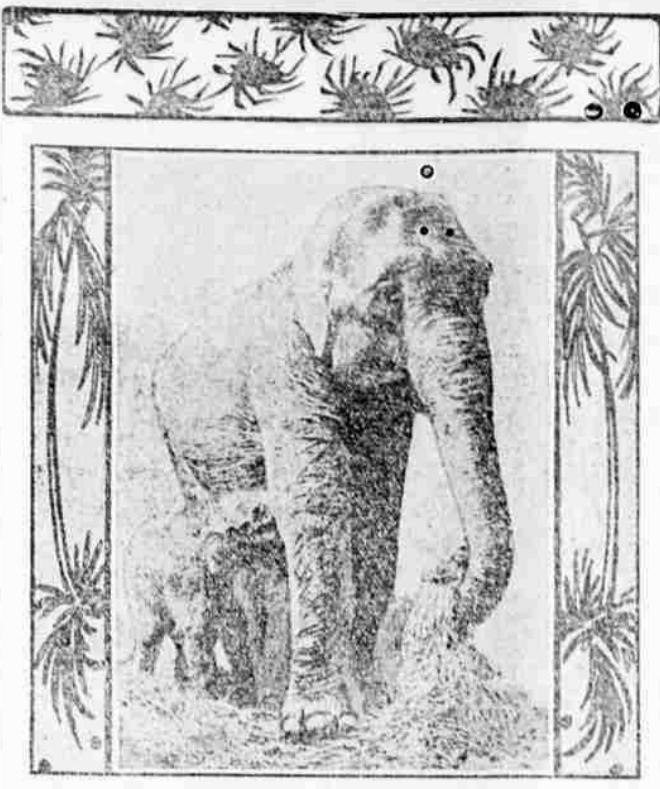

WHAT THE BANKS SHOW (Saturday Evening Post.) The statement of December 3 showed that national banks of the country had outstanding about sixty-five millions of clearing house certificates.

The last statement showed that the banks held the record total of \$26 millions cash—coin, legal tender and bank notes, against 732 millions in August, which was high-water mark at that time.

In short, the position of the banks is decidedly "strong." As regards that important element in business, the banking situation, nothing better could be asked for.

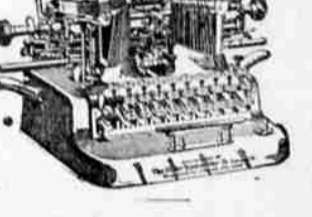
