

## DEATH AND RUIN MARKS TRACK OF SOUTHERN CYCLONES

New Orleans, April 25.—From the best information obtainable the number of deaths in the Gulf states from yesterday's tornadoes was over five hundred, and several thousand were injured. Town after town in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama was visited with great destruction. The tornadoes moved in several directions and apparently lasted about twelve hours.

New Orleans, April 25.—As a result of the terrible storms which have swept the southern Gulf states communication between the cities of this section today is poor and in a majority of cases there is no communication at all. Following reports numerous damages and there are indications that the death list in Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee and Alabama will reach several hundred.

The death list of Annis and immediate vicinity will reach 25. The loss is under martial law. The path of the storm was two and a half miles wide and which passed Annis stood a wreck.

In Concordia parish, La., thirteen were killed.

In Adams county, Miss., twenty-five were killed, and in Jefferson county, thirty-five are dead.

Atlanta, April 25.—Telephone messages report fatalities at Shipley, Harris City and Laurel Grove, all in Georgia.

Mobile, April 25.—Deaths were reported at McCalla, Miss., and great damage was done.

Monro, Ga., April 25.—It is reported that twenty were killed at Cedar town and Cape Springs.

Birmingham, Ala., April 25.—Twenty-five are reported killed at Albertville, Ala.

## TIMBER LOCATOR ARRESTED FOR SERIOUS OFFENSE

M. T. OVERBACK WANTED AT SPOKANE, CHARGED WITH LOCATING TIMBER ON WORTHLESS LAND AFTER SHOWING GOOD TIMBER—SAYS HE WILL BRING SUIT

M. T. Overback, a former timber land locator who resides at 224 Lawrence street in this city, was arrested yesterday by Sheriff Plisk and Constable Sheriff Hunsaker upon a warrant from Spokane, Wash., charging him with obtaining money upon false pretenses. Deputy Sheriff Plisk of Spokane, arrived here last night with the warrant and he left on the noon train today with his wife and child for Spokane, where Overback is being held in extradition.

Overback is charged with locating a number of tracts on worthless land after having shown their good timber land in the vicinity of Spokane, a woman residing here having made the complaint against him. He resided there before coming to Eugene about a year ago, and the offense is alleged to have been committed before he came here. He feels confident that he will be cleared of the charge. His wife and two children reside in Eugene.

## SUNDRY CIVIL BILL REPORTED TO HOUSE

Washington, April 25.—The sundry civil appropriation bill was reported to the house today by the appropriations committee. It carries \$105,715,369, a reduction of \$35,568,997 from the estimates submitted by the departments.

Included in the appropriations recommended is \$27,627,000 for the isthmian canal, which amount is reimbursable to the treasury from proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized. The bill carries for public buildings, marine hospitals, quarantine stations, annual repairs, heating apparatus, vaults, safes and locks \$2,182,375. For improvement of the rivers and harbors under contract the authorization amount to \$17,692,645; life saving service, \$2,268,857; current expenses of the revenue cutter service, \$1,904,000; engraving and printing, \$3,354,758; interstate commerce commission, \$935,000; assistant custodians and janitors of public buildings, \$1,688,872; fuel, lights and water in public buildings, \$1,400,000; expenses of collecting customs additional to permanent appropriations of \$5,500,000 for that purpose in 1909, \$4,500,000; lighthouse establishments, \$5,194,000; enforcement of Chinese exclusion, \$500,000; geological survey, \$1,085,000; expenses of the president, \$78,000; erection of barracks and quarters for coast artillery, \$1,987,260; road to Mount Rainier Park, \$50,000, and various other expenses, bringing the total up to \$105,715,369.

## GREAT THRONGS CHEER BIG FLEET NORTHWARD BOUND

Venice, Cal., April 25.—From the high bluffs of Santa Monica, overlooking the sea, one hundred thousand people from 8:30 to 9 o'clock this morning witnessed the procession of the entire fleet of battleships as they passed northward. No spectacle so superb has ever been witnessed on the coast of Southern California unless it was the arrival a week ago of the same ships and it will be a long time before the patriotic enthusiasm of a great multitude subsides to forgetfulness of the impression made today. Men, women and children by the thousand slept in the open air all night in order to witness the passing of the fleet today. Since noon yesterday every available railroad and electric car has been in operation conveying the crowds, and over one hundred thousand persons viewed the brief maneuvers of the fleet before it proceeded northward to the boom of cannon, cheers of the throng and the waving of tens of thousands of flags.
