### WILLAMETTE WINS PROHIBITION CONTEST

McMinnville, April 24.—Willamette won out in the shape of the state prohibition oratorical contest held in this city tonight, the representative of the "Saloon" institution taking first place. Miss Mary Glitina represented Willamette, and the subject of the oration that won first place was "The Need of Prohibition." It was delivered in a most effective manner, and the verdict of the judges met with general approval. Not only McMinnville, won second place with the oration, "Historic Warnings or National Peril." Third place went to A. C. Allen, of Pacific University, who spoke on the "Twentieth Century Renaissance." Lillian MeVickers, of Dallas, whose theme was "My Country Shall be Pure," won fourth. S. B. Luce, of O. A. C., carried off fifth honors with "A Crying Need." "How Long Shall King Alcohol Reign?" was the subject of Beulah Spalding, of Pacific College, who was given sixth place, and John M. Mason, of Philomath, brought up in the rear with "The Need of Prohibition."

Miss Glitina, winner of the state contest, will go to San Jose, Cal., to take part in the interstate contest to be held there on May 15.

### JEFFREY SECURES DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY

Portland, Or., April 24.—John A. Jeffrey is the Democratic nominee for congress from the second district. He won the nomination from Andrew Jackson Derby by a narrow majority of 145 votes, victory coming to him by reason of his having 755 majority in Multnomah county. The fight for the Democratic nomination has been a very close one. Derby has been in the lead in practically all the counties outside Multnomah in the second district. In Multnomah, however, the home of Jeffrey, Derby did not fare so well, receiving 538 votes to 1293 cast for Jeffrey. This majority of 755 saved the day for Jeffrey, by an approximate majority of 145.

## WANTS MARRIAGE CEREMONY DECLARED NULL AND VOID

MRS. DAVID PARMENTER NO. 2 BEGINS SUIT IN THE CIRCUIT COURT—MARRIED PARMENTER THINKING HIS FIRST WIFE HAD BEEN DEAD TWO YEARS

Louisa A. Bowen today began suit in the circuit court against David B. Parmenter, asking the court to annul and declare void their marriage, which was solemnized in Eugene October 21, 1907, by Rev. M. C. Wire. It will be remembered that Parmenter, who resided on a farm near Walker station, was sued for divorce by Mrs. Parmenter No. 1 last fall on the ground that he had married another woman without being legally free from his first wife. She was granted the divorce and Parmenter was arrested on the charge of bigamy. When his case came up for trial at the last term of court he could not be found and his bond was declared forfeited.

Mrs. Parmenter alleges in her complaint that Parmenter, in June, 1907, falsely and fraudulently represented to her through letters that he was unmarried; that his wife had been dead for two years; that he owned a valuable farm worth \$5000 and raised wheat, oats, corn and several kinds of fruit, that he was a man who "remembered his God," and requested her to come to Oregon from North Dakota, where she was then living, and become his wife. He also asked her to bring her son and he would educate him and make a farmer of him. She came to Oregon and the marriage ceremony was performed in Eugene by Rev. M. C. Wire on October 21, 1907.

It will be remembered that when Mrs. Parmenter No. 1 arrived here from Tacoma to begin suit for divorce Mrs. Parmenter No. 2 immediately left Parmenter, who afterward left the country.

### PROCLAMATION

Whereas, there was submitted to the people of the city of Eugene, Oregon, at a special election for that purpose on the 18th day of April, 1908, an initiative proposal after being read by the Common Council pursuant to and in accordance with the general laws of the state of Oregon, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the charter of said city, and whereas there was at the same time submitted to the people of said city for their approval or rejection an initiative proposal to amend the charter of said city by adding a section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto within the city, or the burial of human bodies therein, except under certain conditions, and whereas, the votes cast at said election having been this 20th day of April, 1908, duly canvassed and determined and the said amendment of said sections 108 and 112 as above said having carried by an affirmative vote of 667 as against 174 negative votes thereon.

Now, therefore, I, J. B. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor, do hereby certify, announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast for and against said proposed amendments are as stated above, and that said amendments received an affirmative majority of all votes cast and that said proposed amendments, from the date hereof, be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the city of Eugene, and a part of the charter of said city.

That said proposed amendment of the charter by adding an additional section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto failed to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon and thereby failed to become a law of said city or a part of the charter thereof.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this 20th day of April, 1908, and caused the seal of said city to be hereunto affixed.

The Lane County Democratic Central Committee met at the law office of L. M. Travis in the Eugene Loan & Savings bank building this forenoon at 10 o'clock, 12 persons being represented. There were also present a number of the candidates for county offices.

The committee ratified the action of last Wednesday in re-selecting the old officers, who are: L. M. Travis, chairman; M. S. Wallis, secretary, and S. S. Spencer, treasurer. The committee discussed plans for the coming campaign and decided to accept Statement No. 3 as the paramount issue on the legislative ticket. A motion was made and carried that the officers of the central committee be empowered to select delegates from the county to the state convention at Portland, to be held some time next month, and that the delegates be instructed to use all honorable means to have the state convention instruct the Oregon delegates to the Democratic national convention to vote for William Jennings Bryan as the nominee for president.
