

ODD FELLOWS CELEBRATE THEIR ANNIVERSARY

BIG PARADE ON STREETS BY DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF ORDER THIS FORENOON

EXERCISES IN EUGENE THEATRE WITH AN ADDRESS BY COL. J. M. WILLIAMS AND A PROGRAM THIS AFTERNOON—FIRST PUBLIC APPEARANCE OF UNIFORM BARK

Lane Odd Fellows and Rebekahs are today celebrating the 80th anniversary of the order. The day was propitious for the occasion, the sun shining brightly for the parade on the streets in the forenoon and bringing a large crowd out for the exercises in the theatre.

The parade formed about 10:30 o'clock this forenoon in front of the I. O. O. F. temple on Willamette street. It was headed by the president of the Spencer Butte lodge No. 9, followed by the Eugene Military band. Then came Canton Hovey, Patriarch Militant, the uniform rank of the Odd Fellows, followed by the members of Spencer Butte lodge and Wima-whala encampment, the Rebekahs bringing up the rear. The parade extended over a block in length and was admired by large crowds on the streets. After a circuit of several blocks the lodges returned to the Eugene theatre, where appropriate exercises were held.

There were also in the line of march quite a number of members of the Coburg, Crow, Springfield and other lodges of the county, many members from outside the city being here to help the local lodge men celebrate.

This was the first appearance of Canton Hovey. The members were clad in their bright new uniforms with plumed hats and presented a striking appearance.

At the theatre this forenoon the principal feature of the exercises was an address by Colonel John M. Williams, of this city. He dwelt on the history of the order and its growth and progress during the past many years since its organization.

PUGILISTIC CONTESTS AMONG THE SAILORS.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 23.—The last of the prizefights to be held here in connection with the stay of the American battleship fleet at the ports of Los Angeles were decided today at Chutes Park with Champion James J. Jeffries as referee. All the sailors on shore leave were gathered about the open air ring and much money was wagered on the three contests which decided the featherweight, middleweight and heavyweight championship of the fleet. On the heavy weight event it is said that the crews of the New Jersey and Missouri put up a total of \$7500 each on the result.

Winners of Events.
Philip Schlossberg of the New Jersey, won this event from Walter Altierl of the Missouri, in six rounds, the decision being based on points, as neither man was near knockout when the final gong sounded.

In the middleweight class, Dennis Tighe, of the Alabama, defeated Henry Trainer of the Vermont, the bout going the limit of six rounds and the decision again being based on points. In the featherweight division, Frank Rafferty, also of the Alabama, defeated Bud Frederick of the Illinois, in six rounds. As a consequence of the double victory of the men of the Alabama, the sailors of that ship are making merry in lively fashion tonight.
