CONSTRUCTION WORK ON P. E. & E. GOES AHEAD

A. Welch, general manager of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway, came up from Portland this afternoon to look after the construction work here. He stated to a reporter that several carloads of rails for the Springfield line and the extension of the city lines to Hendricks' park are now over due and they ought to be here any day. The grade from the Southern Pacific track at the end of East Thirteenth street to the point where the big trestle begins at Judkins' Point, is almost finished and as soon as the crossing track arrives it will be placed in position at the crossing with the S. P. track and construction work will go right ahead. At the same time the park extension will be built.
