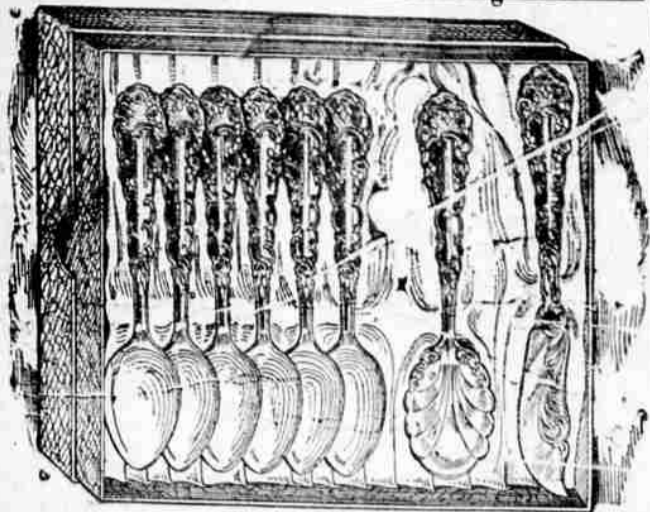

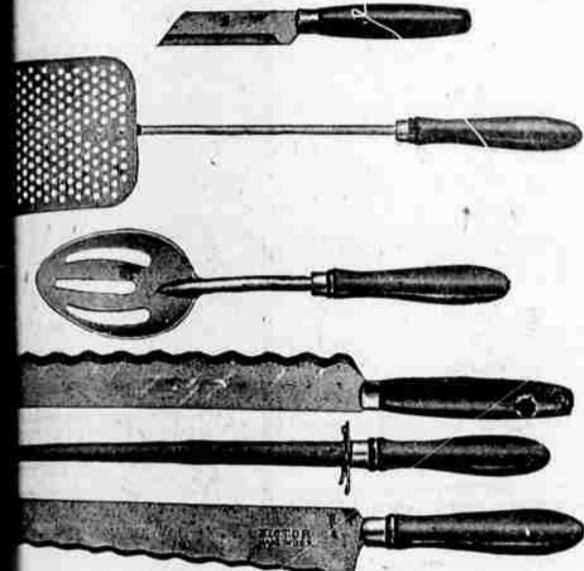

MANUFACTURERS ARE SOLID FOR STATE UNIVERSITY

(Oreonian)
The Manufacturers' Association at a recent meeting passed the following resolutions:

Whereas, the last session of the Oregon legislature by an almost unanimous vote passed a bill appropriating one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) annually for the maintenance of the University of Oregon, and

Whereas, the referendum has been latched to defeat said appropriation, which action we believe to have been inspired by local jealousies which are detrimental to the best interests of the state of Oregon; and

Whereas, the entire state of Oregon is at the present time making rapid development along all lines and attracting a desirable class of immigrants from all parts of the East and Middle West; and

Whereas, the defeat of the pending appropriation bill, by the voters of the state would seriously injure the reputation of the state of Oregon in all parts of the Union and would tend to keep out of this state such immigrants of the desirable class; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Manufacturers' Association of the Northwest, That we express our hearty approval of the appropriation of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, annually, and we pledge our individual efforts to enlist the co-operation of all loyal citizens of Oregon to not only vote for the pending bill at the coming election, but to use all honorable and legitimate means to induce all those who have the welfare of the state of Oregon at heart to support this measure; and be it further

Resolved, That we extend an earnest appeal to all commercial organizations within our state to assist in the passage of this appropriation bill; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be given to the Portland newspapers for publication.

DANCING MASTER FORD ASSAULTED ON STREET

W. Stewart beats his face because of refusal to admit him and his sister to dance.

W. Stewart, a young man residing in Eugene, was arrested by Chief of Police Farrington this morning for assault and battery, alleged to have been committed upon Professor Ford, the dancing master who conducts Saturday night dances in Davies' hall on East Ninth street. He was taken before Police Judge Dorris and a state charge lodged against him. He has agreed to appear again tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock before the same official, acting as justice of the peace ex-officio, in the absence of Judge Bryson.

It is alleged that Stewart walked up to Ford on the street near the Hotel Gross Sunday afternoon and proceeded to give him a beating. It is said that the trouble was over the fact that Ford refused to admit Stewart to the dance Saturday night, while the latter was with his sister. This angered Stewart and he proceeded to thrash Ford the first time he saw him on the street.

Professor Ford, not knowing that the young lady was Stewart's sister, emphatically refused to admit them when they appeared at the door of the dance hall, and the young man naturally took it as a rank insult to his sister.

Prof. Ford's statement. Professor Ford handed the following to The Guard this morning as his statement of the affair: "Stewart has attended my social dances for about four months. The last two months he has made himself so obnoxious that I have had to tell him that he must not come to my place of business any more, but he forced his way in, until last Saturday I told him he could not come in, and that I should not allow him to enter my premises. So he left and on Sunday at about 3 o'clock I was at the depot and returned to the Gross hotel and was standing on the porch when he called me down on the side walk and called me a vile name. He struck me on the left temple and knocked me down and kicked and struck me in the face and head until I was almost unconscious. His friends pretended to pull him off me, and the spectators, about 30, did not understand why they did not pull him off until they saw it was too late.

SAYS, O. S. E. BATES ON LUMBER ARE TOO HIGH

Salem, Or., April 25.—Elmer L. Doolittle, of the Cerro Gordo Lumber Company, complains that the carload rates on railroad ties and lumber rates on lumber and railroad ties on the Oregon & Southern are too exorbitant and asks the railroad commission to come to the relief of the lumber manufacturing interests along the line and secure for them a reduction in the tariff schedule. He says the present rate for lumber is \$1 per 1000, and that upon railroad ties 75 cents, and that when there is a market for lumber the manufacturers are hit pretty hard. He says he has paid as high as \$31.86 on a carload shipment on a seven-mile haul from his mill to Cottage Grove.

The citizens of Latham, along the line of the Southern Pacific, near Cottage Grove, ask the railroad commission to interfere to secure the reinstatement of Latham as a flag station for passenger trains Nos. 11 and 12, as the station is entirely without train service, except for freight. The complaint is signed by E. M. Sharp, and he states that General Manager O'Brien has been petitioned for the relief asked, but that that official has thus far ignored the people's request.

PROCLAMATION
Whereas, there was submitted to the people of the city of Eugene, Oregon, at a special election for that purpose on the 18th day of April, 1908, an initiative proposal after being ordained by the Common Council, pursuant to and in accordance with the general laws of the state of Oregon, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the charter of said city, and whereas there was at the same time submitted to the people of said city for their approval or rejection an initiative proposal to amend the charter of said city by adding a section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto within the city, or the burial of human bodies therein, except under certain conditions, and

Whereas, the votes cast at said election having been this 20th day of April, 1908, duly canvassed and determined and the said amendment of said sections 108 and 112 as aforesaid having carried by an affirmative vote of 667 as against 171 negative votes thereon.

Now, therefore, I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor, do hereby proclaim, announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast for and against said proposed amendments are as stated above, and that said amendments received an affirmative majority of all votes cast and that said proposed amendments, from the date hereof, be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the city of Eugene, and a part of the charter of said city.

That said proposed amendment of the charter by adding an additional section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto failed to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon and thereby failed to become a law of said city or a part of the charter thereof.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this 20th day of April, 1908, and caused the seal of said city to be hereunto affixed.
