DR. BROUGHER STANDS FIRM FOR UNIVERSITY SUPPORT

"One of the greatest calamities that could befall the state of Oregon in the coming June election would be the failure of the people of Oregon to stand by the appropriation of \$125,000 given the university at the last session of the legislature."

In these words Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher gave his views on the appropriation for the State University at the White Temple yesterday morning. He spoke on "Christian Culture." He said in part:

"The perfected character which marks the truly cultured man must be given proper conditions and exercise for development; and the additional time for full growth. Christian culture, therefore, involves the whole being. It concerns itself with the individual physically, spiritually, and intellectually. For the all-around development of our young people we have founded our denominational schools. In fact, I have nearly everything to say in its favor."

"I have been to Eugene. I have looked into the entire situation and every cent of that money is needed by the institution to meet the demands of the present moment made upon it by the large attendance of students. Class rooms and laboratories are over-crowded. The heating plant is inadequate to heat all the buildings. The library is without light and the girls' dormitory cannot be used because there is not money enough to complete it. In order to avoid a default the professors were compelled to teach three months last year without salaries. Every voter who loves his state and loves the young men and women of Oregon and who wishes to give them an adequate education at the State University will vote, I believe, in favor of that appropriation."—Portland Journal.

Mrs. Elizabeth Vorego, of Cottage Grove, aged 80 years, was found dead Sunday. She was born at Xenia, Ohio, in 1828.
