## U. OF O. STUDENTS GIVEN CHANCE TO WIN PRIZE

An invitation has been given to students of University of Oregon to compete for valuable prizes. The prizes are offered for the purpose of arousing an interest in the study of topics relating to commerce and industry, and the invitation comes from Professor J. Laurence Laughlin of the University of Chicago, who is chairman of the committee in charge, the other members being Professor J. B. Clark, Columbia University; Professor H. C. Adams, University of Michigan; Horace White Esq., New York City; and Hon. Carroll D. Wright, Clark College.

Students who wish to compete are allowed until June 1, 1909, to make their studies and finish their essays. The prizes are divided into several classes giving everyone who is interested in problems pertaining to business an opportunity to compete.

Class "A" includes any American without restriction; the first prize in this class is \$400 and the second \$100. Class "B" includes those who are undergraduates of any American college, and any member of this class may compete for the prizes of class "A." The first prize in this class is \$200 and the second is \$50. The following are the subjects suggested by the committee for the essays:

1. German and American of regulating trusts.
2. The angle of "Progress and Poverty."
3. What are the ultimate ends of trade-unions and can these be gained by any application of the principles of monopoly?
4. In view of existing railway progress, should the United States encourage the construction of waterways?
5. Is it to be expected that the present and recent production of gold will cause a higher level of prices?

Class "C" is for those who have not had an academic training. A prize of \$500 is offered for the best production on any one of the following subjects:

1. The best scheme for uniform corporation accounts.
2. Desirable methods of improving our trade with China.
3. The proper spheres of the trust company and the commercial bank.
4. The relations of Oriental immigration to American industries.
5. The relative efficiency of American and European labor in manufacturing industries.

The prizes are donated by Messrs. Hart, Shaffner & Marx, of Chicago.

of steel for any purpose in that section of the country. As regards the city of Boston, the combination resulted in parcelling the work by bids, plainly dishonest, and supported by false affirmations.

Surely such a state of affairs is such as calls for further legislation, not merely for the material benefit such legislation would secure, but above all because this federal action should be part, and a large part, of the campaign to waken our people as a whole to a lively and effective condemnation of the low standard of morality implied in such conduct on the part of the great business concerns. The first duty of every man is to give wide a livelihood for himself and those dependent upon him; it is from every standpoint desirable that each of our citizens should endeavor by hard work and honorable methods to secure for himself and them a competence as will carry with it the opportunity to enjoy in reasonable fashion the comforts and refinements in life.

Furthermore, the man of great great ability, who obtains a fortune in upright fashion, inevitably in so doing confers a benefit upon humanity as a whole and is entitled to a reward, to respect and admiration. But among the many kinds of evil, social, political and industrial, which it is our duty as a nation strongly to combat, there is none so dangerous as the greed which treats the plain and simple rules of honesty with cynical contempt if they interfere with making a profit, and we cannot be held guiltless if we condone such action.

We are striving for legislation to minimize the abuses which give this type its flourishing prominence, partly for the sake of what can be accomplished and by the legislation itself and partly because the legislation makes our participation to a great and stern moral developments to bring our ideals into measurable accord.

## ROGUE RIVER FRUIT DAMAGED BY FROST

Medford, Or., April 27.—While the heavy frost of last Friday night did some damage to the cherry and pear crops of the lower valley, and the full extent of the damage is not yet determined, reports in today are to the effect that the apple crop in the vicinity of Medford is not injured, and in the great staples of Bartlett and Comice pears the damage is but trifling in the majority of orchards, although here and there some orchards have been thinned too much. There will be still a fairly good crop of cherries and peaches and bottom soil and a fine crop on high lands.

It was demonstrated in the Gore orchard, where fires were kindled that night, that smudging in this section, where there is no breeze stirring at night, is an entire success. They succeeded in raising the temperature in the orchard six degrees during Friday night, thus preventing all damage by frost. The frost accentuates the value of the foothill land for tender fruits like peaches, apricots and some varieties of pears, no damage at all being reported in the foothills.

Indications point to a good crop of all fruits in the Medford district.
