## CITY NEWS

The cribbing for the concrete basement of the high school addition is completed.

The East Eleventh Street Improvement Club will meet tonight at the residence of F. J. Hard.

The woman's auxiliary to the Commercial Club will meet at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening at the club.

Contractor Heckart started a force of men to work building the concrete walls of the new Beckwith block this morning.

H. L. Clison is preparing to build a seven-room, two-story residence on one of his lots in the northwest part of town, to cost about \$2000.

Contractor Heckart has about finished the work on J. A. Cross' new residence on West Tenth street, between Lincoln and Lawrence.

The carpenter work on the new Finnegan block is about completed. Mr. Finnegan will be able to occupy the building in about two weeks.

A 12-foot cement walk is being constructed in front of the new Potts and Finnegan blocks on Olive street.

Otto Adrian, an employe of Broders Bros., had an eye removed in Salem the other day. He had been trouble with the member for years.

An ox team on the streets this morning created considerable curiosity. It reminded the old-timers of pioneer days, when they crossed the plains with such outfits.

M. S. Hubble, who has been very ill for the past three months, was brought down town in a wheel chair this afternoon. His many friends were very glad to see him out.

The rear portion of the old frame building on the lot to be occupied by the Odd Fellows' five-story brick building is now on rollers and will start for its destination in the vicinity of Geo. T. Hall's warehouse tomorrow.

King Henderson, formerly of Eugene, was defeated at the primaries for commissioner of Lake county on the Republican ticket, but he will be an independent candidate at the June election.

Next Saturday afternoon the University baseball team will play Salem high. In the game at Salem the scholastic nine lost a twelve-inning game by the score of 3 to 2 to the "varsity."

Attorney D. V. Kuykendall, formerly of Eugene, received the nomination on the Republican ticket for prosecuting attorney in the first district. He is now located at Klamath Falls.

Free Thomas went to Junction this forenoon to deliver the plans for the new parsonage of the M. E. church, South, there and came back this afternoon and went on to Cottage Grove.

W. Stewart, who assaulted Professor Ford, the dancing master, Sunday afternoon, pleaded guilty before Police Judge Dorris, acting in the capacity of justice of the peace, and was fined \$35 this morning.

Work has been commenced on E. J. Frasier's cement walk on Willamette street. The Warren Construction Company has sub-let the contract to T. H. Ellis and the gravel for the walk was hauled today.

The Co-operative Construction Company today instituted suit in the circuit court against Samuel R. Williams to recover \$180 with interest at 6 per cent from May 12, 1907. L. M. Travis is attorney for the plaintiff.

The Warren Construction Company again resumed the laying of the pavement on West Ninth street this morning. East Ninth street will be the next to be paved. Then comes Seventh street, and after that East Eleventh street.

President Williams has called a special meeting of the Commercial Club for Thursday at 8 o'clock to discuss the subject of Eugene's participation in the rose carnival at Portland. A full attendance is desired.

Among the carload lots of freight received in Eugene this morning were the following: A car of feed for A. W. Haskell from Harrisburg; a car of coal for the gas plant and a car of stone for the Divinity School from Tenino, Wash.

Walter T. Carroll, of this city, has bought the Red Cross Drug Store at Junction City and will move there with his wife to reside soon. Walter is a first-class druggist. He has been employed in Yerington's store here for some time past.

According to the plans of Manager Clifford, the University of Oregon Glee Club will give a concert, to make up its deficit, a week from Friday night. Both the Mandolin Club and the Glee Club will appear. Several new stunts are being arranged. The object is to make up the deficit of last season.

Charles L. Willman, has resigned his position as chief clerk at the Hotel Smeede, the resignation to take effect on May 1. He will accept the position as manager of the Hotel Gross at that time. Mr. Willman is a first-class hotel man, and the guests at the Smeede will be glad to see him leave the hotel.

The Burkholder-Woods Company filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk today. The incorporators are C. H. Burkholder, D. L.

Woods, Lee Roy Woods and Clara A. Burkholder. The principal place of business is Cottage Grove and the capital stock \$25,000. The object of the corporation is to conduct a general merchandise business.

James Murphy, an employe of the People's restaurant, was arrested last night by Chief of Police Farrington upon a complaint sworn to by Frank Infelt, charging him with using indecent language. When the case came up for trial in the police court this forenoon Infelt decided to withdraw the charge, and Murphy was released from custody.

In the case of H. C. Mahon vs. M. B. Rankin, in which the plaintiff secured a judgment against the defendant for \$40,000 commission on the sale of timber land, the attorneys for the defendant today filed in the circuit court a motion for a new trial on the following grounds: First, the insufficiency of evidence to justify a verdict, and that it is against law; second, error in law occurring at the trial and excepted to by defendant. W. D. Fenton and Coover & Stapleton are the attorneys for Rankin.

The promotion department of the Commercial Club secured a promise from A. Welch, manager of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Co., and of the Willamette Valley Co., while he was in the city yesterday, that the light and trolley poles of the company on Willamette and East Eleventh streets, would be painted at once. Mr. Welch stated that he was willing to do everything in his power to help beautify the city, but would paint the poles only where the streets are paved or are to be paved at once.

Advanced vaudeville will be presented at the Eugene theatre tonight. The big vaudeville show which Sullivan & Considine bring direct from the Grand theatre, Portland, will be the attraction.
