

TWO OLD RIVALS TO CROSS BATS TOMORROW

There will be something doing at Recreation Park tomorrow afternoon from 3 until about 5 o'clock, when the two rival high school teams, Eugene and Salem, meet. It is conceded by all who have seen the two teams play this year that they are the two fastest high school nines in the state. There is no chance for any definite comparison of the two teams, but the fact that Salem high played the U. of O. team to a standstill in a twelve-inning game, finally losing by the narrow margin of 3 to 2, shows that the Salem high school bunch are playing silt-edged ball.

The showing made by some of the Salem men in this game is something remarkable. Kay, for instance, the fifty fifth third baseman, who accepted nine chances without a single error. Roberts, at shortstop, was not far behind with a record of seven chances without a single error.

The rest of the Salem line-up will be as follows: Jones, catcher; Keene, pitcher; Gabrielson, first base; Polly Farmer, second base. The outfield positions will be held down by Perkins, Niles and Hill.

Against this formidable line-up Eugene will place the fastest team that has ever represented her. Some of her men are stars so well known that they need no recommendation. Among this class is found Captain Carl King, the heady little backstop, Lloyd Wilson, the well-known twirler, and Ben Chandler, of the Coos Bay league. Other consistent players on the E. H. S. line-up are Anderson on first, Sweeney on second, Browne Roome on third, and Brick Cockerline, shortstop.

These men are mostly new to the game, but the effect of hard, consistent practice under the direction of an efficient coach is shown in their fast work and it is safe to say that few, if any, errors will be made by any of the infielders.

The outfield positions will be held by Ben Chandler, Gwynn Watson and either John Ellis or Wendell Barbour.

As both teams have played several games they should be practically immune from balloon ascensions. A close game and small score is therefore expected.

The game will be called at 3:30 Thursday afternoon. Admission will be 25 cents at the gate and 10 cents at the grandstand. Ladies, however, will be admitted free to the grandstand on tomorrow afternoon. Ben Bingham, the well-known baseball umpire, will officiate at the game.
