STEEL MAIL CARS TO BE USED ON ESPEE

Steel mail cars have recently been put on the Southern Pacific between San Francisco and Portland. While the coaches have not been used regularly the mail clerks have hopes that in the near future several of the all steel cars will be used on this line.

Postal officials have received assurance from the Harriman officials that the intention of the company is to replace all wood mail cars as they are abandoned with the steel coaches which have met with the approval of the postoffice department.

As the wood cars now in use are taken from the runs where they have been for years in many cases the steel cars will take their places. Within two or three years it is figured that every mail coach on the Harriman lines out of Portland will be of the steel variety.

PARMENTER SAYS HE'S VICTIM OF CIRCUMSTANCES

PRESS DISPATCH FROM OMAHA TELLS OF HIS ARREST THERE FOR BIGAMY AND GIVES HIS SIDE OF THE STORY—RETURNS WITHOUT REQUISITION

A press dispatch from Omaha tells of the arrest of David Parmenter, the Lane county bigamist, as follows:

Omaha, Neb., April 28.—A matrimonial paper and a Huron, S. D., widow, are the causes assigned by David Parmenter, of Eugene, Or., brother of Judge O. S. Parmenter, of Spokane, Wash., for his arrest for bigamy. Parmenter is an old soldier, Union veteran, 60 years old. According to his story, he is a victim of circumstances. He says wife No. 1, whom he does not consider mentally responsible, left him 11 years ago. Several months later she came back and he nursed her through a very severe illness. Then, he declares, she left him again and went to live with his daughter at Mandan, N. D.

Last summer, Parmenter says, he received a telegram from his daughter announcing the death of his wife. His brother, Judge Parmenter, of Spokane, is said to have received a similar telegram. Seeking again the joys of companionship, through the medium of a matrimonial journal, Parmenter offered Mrs. Louisa Bowen, of Huron, S. D., \$200 a year to act as his housekeeper. She replied that she was in the matrimonial market, but was not looking for an employer. They were married in Oregon last October.

After a week of wedded bliss had elapsed, wife No. 1 appeared on the scene and began prosecution for bigamy. Wife No. 2 joined her and Parmenter was indicted by an Oregon grand jury. He fled to Omaha, where he has a son, and was located here through the address of his pension papers. His arrest here was made at the request of the Oregon authorities, who have notified the sheriff here that they will send for him.

Parmenter is under a \$500 bond in Oregon. He says he will return without a requisition.

BAILEY HILL GOLD MINE IS A MYTH

MINING MAN EXAMINES ROCK AND CAN FIND NO TRACE OF GOLD OR SILVER

A local paper a few days ago reported the finding of a vein of gold-bearing quartz on H. McCollum's farm at Bailey Hill, a few miles west of Eugene, and stated that the ledge was sixty feet wide, bearing free gold and silver. The story has created some excitement and since then quite a number of persons have visited the premises where the alleged mine of wealth had been discovered. A well-known resident of Eugene, who has mined a greater part of his life, drove out to the place yesterday. He examined some of the rock which McCollum had dug out of the side of the hill and found that it contained not a trace of gold or silver. McCollum was pounding some of it in a glue pot with a king bolt from a wagon, and small particles of iron worn from the king bolt were mixed up with the dust into which the rock had been pounded. This, McCollum thought, was silver, but this mining man soon convinced him of his error.

HARRY BOWN CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

Harry L. Bown, the Democratic nominee for sheriff of Lane county, was born in Fulton county, Illinois, December 22nd, 1866, and with his parents moved to Lane county in the summer of 1884 and settled near Elmira. After receiving the education afforded by the county school of the neighborhood, his father not being able to educate him further, he worked out for neighboring farmers, thereby supplying the means to attend the Eugene public schools and thereafter taught school; and by this obtained means with which to attend the normal school at Monmouth. In 1900, and while teaching school, he was offered and accepted the second deputyship by the late Sheriff W. W. Withers, and which position he filled with credit to himself until the latter's death in 1903. During



this time Mr. Bown worked mostly in the sheriff's office and was ever found accommodating, careful and accurate and a first-class and efficient clerical man. Upon the death of Sheriff Withers, Sheriff Flisk appointed Mr. Bown as his chief deputy and here his work was mostly outside the office and here he was over found a man of clear and quick judgment, cool-headed and careful in the discharge of his official duties. Mr. Bown has a family of a wife and two boys and fraternally he belongs to the I. O. O. F. and Workmen.

Harry Bown is a self-made man. Building himself up from the lot of a poor country boy to his present position in life, and for his unswerving honesty, temperate habits and a clean record, personally and officially, that bears the closest scrutiny, he commands the respect of all, irrespective of political party affiliations.

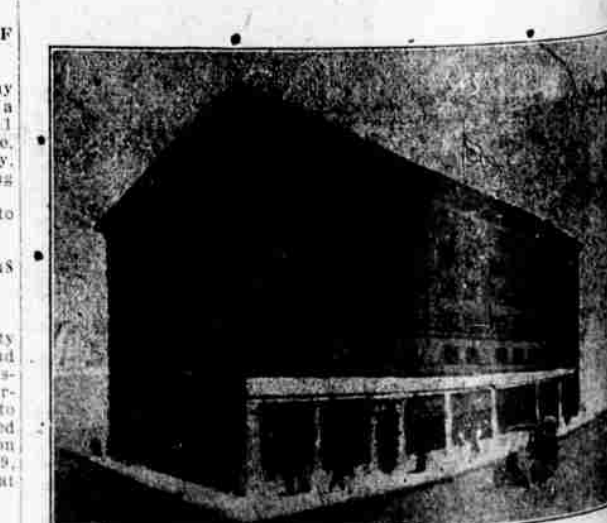

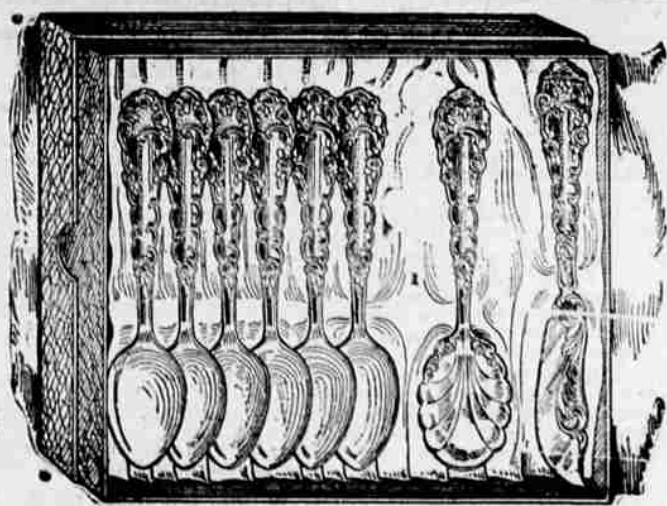

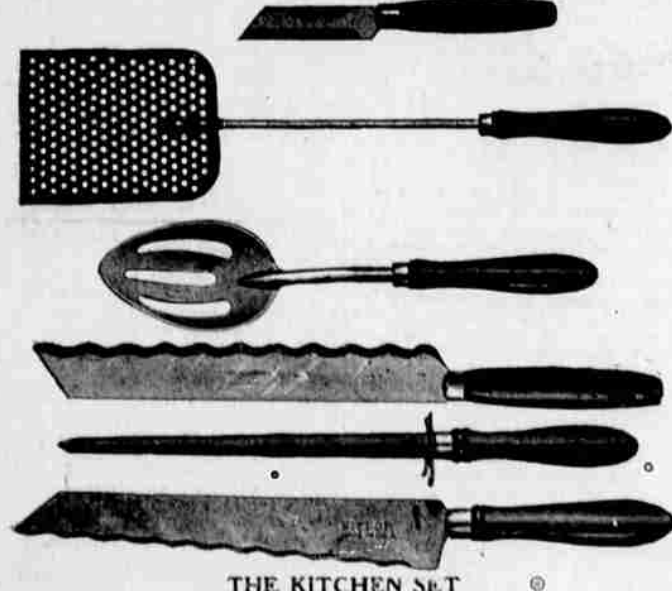
