### SUNSHINE LAST WEEK LESS THAN AVERAGE

The following is from the weekly bulletin issued by the weather bureau for the week ending Tuesday, April 22:

During the fore part of the week the weather was cool and showery. On Wednesday and Thursday a severe storm prevailed, which was accompanied by high winds over the entire state. The rainfall over the district west of the Cascades was rather heavy, but only moderate in the eastern and southern counties. Hail occurred in many parts of the state. Clearing weather with rapidly falling temperatures set in on Friday evening, and on Saturday morning frosts were general over the entire state, accompanied in southern and eastern Oregon by freezing temperatures. Clear skies prevailed on Saturday and Sunday, with temperatures rapidly rising under the influence of the uninterrupted sunshine. Taking the week as a whole, the sunshine averaged much less than usual.

**Coast District**

Doraville, Columbia county.—The week was cloudy, showers and warm; with the exception of Friday, when a cold northwest storm, with sleet, prevailed.

Newport, Lincoln county.—The week was showery.

Marshfield, Coos county.—Showers occurred on almost every day. A high wind blew about 8 p. m. Thursday. Light frost formed Thursday morning.

Fairview, Coos county.—The week was cloudy. A severe storm, accompanied by high southwest winds and heavy rainfall, occurred on Thursday evening.

**Willamette Valley**

Portland, Multnomah county.—The week was cloudy and showery until Saturday, when clear weather set in. A severe storm, accompanied by high southwest winds and heavy rainfall, occurred on Thursday.

Salem, Marion county.—The fore part of the week was cloudy, with light rains. A very heavy frost occurred on Saturday morning.

Corvallis, Benton county.—Showery weather prevailed until Saturday. A heavy frost occurred on Friday.

Monroe, Benton county.—Stormy weather and high winds occurred on Thursday and Friday. Hail fell on Friday. A killing frost occurred Saturday morning.

Eugene, Lane county.—This week was cloudy and rainy until Saturday afternoon, when bright and clear weather set in.

Bull Run, Clackamas county.—Cloudy weather, with light rains, prevailed.

**Southern Oregon**

Drain, Douglas county.—Cloudy weather with drizzling rain prevailed during the greater portion of the week. Thursday night and Friday were stormy, with nearly half an inch of rainfall. The week closed fair and bright, with cool nights and light frost.

Grants Pass, Josephine county.—The fore part of the week was cool and cloudy, but the latter part was clear. A heavy frost occurred on Saturday morning.

Ashland, Jackson county.—The week was cloudy and cool.

The killing occurred on several different days when the weather was warm and bright and the snakes came out of their den to take a sun bath. On Sunday last, fourteen were killed.

Up to the time this den was located and watched no one in the vicinity had any idea that there were any rattlesnakes to speak of in the neighborhood and the large number killed to date has occasioned much surprise. The skins, rattles and oil of the snakes are taken care of and preserved for various uses.

### OBITUARY

Died, at his home in Cloverdale, Lane county, Oregon, April 22, 1903, after a week's illness, from pneumonia, James Parker.

James Parker was born in Coshocton county, Ohio, March 19, 1833. While yet a child his parents moved to Indiana, and from there to Illinois. His parents died when he was fourteen years old, and in 1853 he and his younger brother, Joseph M. Parker, and two sisters, Mrs. James Parson and Mrs. John Stoops, crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in Hatfield's valley, this county, and from there he moved to Pleasant Hill and in 1868 he bought and moved to the farm on which he lived until his death.

October 1, 1857, he was married to Phoebe E. Rigdon, who died July 14, 1904, and to them were born eleven children, eight sons and three daughters, nine of whom survive him, Luella M. (deceased), Albert K., Lucien (deceased), Hortense L., Clarence A., Edith B., John C., James C., Leroy C., Guy W., and Augustus. One sister, Mrs. James Parvin, and three brothers, J. M. and W. R. Parker, of Dexter, this county, and Martin Parker, of Springfield, Missouri, survive him.

He served this county as commissioner for four years as a Democrat, and was elected without making a canvass of the county, and against a very large Republican majority.

Uncle Jim and Aunt Phoebe, as they were known by their many friends, were noted for their hospitality, and will be greatly missed by the community in which they lived so many years.
