SEATTLE MAKING PREPARATIONS FOR VISIT OF FLEET

(Special to The Guard.) Seattle, April 26.—Elaborate preparations are being made by the Chamber of Commerce Reception and Entertainment committee to care for properly the large crowd of visitors expected in this city during the coming reception and entertainment in Seattle harbor of the officers and men of the Atlantic battleship fleet.

By the time the fleet arrives here on May 23rd, the Seattle Chamber of Commerce will have on hand a complete list of the available rooms in the city for transient guests, in addition to a thorough list of all hotels, their accommodations and rates. These lists, together with information of all the various points of interest in the city, street car routes, complete data as to the location in the harbor of the various battleships, and such information as will permit visitors to reach the ships without confusion and all other matters of interest to visitors, will be at the command of out-of-town sightseers, free of charge, at an information bureau to be opened and maintained during the stay of the fleet, in Pioneer Place.

This information bureau will be in charge of competent and courteous officials whose special duty will be to care for the comfort and convenience of visitors, and to see that everybody is supplied with a comfortable home while the guest of this city.

One of the greatest events of the program of entertainment for the public, will be the aquatic sports on the bay. These will include boat races by crews from the battleships, launch races by the swiftest tenders from the warships, and other events of like character. In order that the public may have opportunity to view these races in comfort not only will many barges be provided by private parties for carrying visitors to the scene but permission will be obtained from the Admiral of the fleet, for persons to view the races from the decks of the warships.

The battleships will be moored in a huge horseshoe formation around the bay, and as the races and other aquatic events will take place within this horseshoe the spacious decks of the war vessels will provide room for thousands who desire to enjoy the spectacle.

Announcements have already been made, by the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Oregon Railway & Navigation Co., and the Canadian Pacific, that they will grant to Seattle during the stay of the fleet from every point in the Northwest, These tickets will give a ten day return privilege so there will be no unnecessary crowding of trains, and those who wish to take a lengthy holiday will have an opportunity to gratify their desire.

The great land parade that will be one of the features of the celebration will take place on the morning of Monday, May 25th. That day will furnish the greatest military spectacle ever offered the people of the Northwest. There will be ten thousand men in line, including sailors and marines from the battleships, fourteen companies of coast artillery from three Puget Sound forts, companies of infantry from Fort Lawton, national guardsmen and many uniformed fraternal organizations.

Elaborate preparations are being made for decorating the city and the line of march of the parade will be literally covered with flags, bunting and other hangings that will make a splendid background for the brilliant pageant to pass before the thousands of persons who will crowd every point of vantage.

The hotels and restaurants are making unusual preparations to care for the thousands of visitors, and all have agreed not only to refrain from raising prices during the stay of the fleet, but have signified their intention of setting forth special menus as an indication of their share of the hospitality Seattle will extend toward her guests.

BIG ELEPHANT ATTACKS SMALL SHETLAND PONY

One of the big trained elephants at Norris & Rowe's circus last night became enraged for some unknown cause and attacked one of the best trained Shetland ponies with the show, fearfully pounding and mauling the tiny horse.

The attack was made just as the evening performance closed. The beast trumpeted with rage, knocked his keeper to one side and rushed at the pony, felling it with a blow from his powerful trunk. The little horse, taken by surprise, vainly struggled to get upon its feet, but the elephant stamped upon him, breaking the pony's leg and crushing his ribs and injuring him severely internally.

The big beast was finally driven off by his keeper. The pony was carried to the hospital car and placed in a swing. Its leg was set and it was otherwise bandaged. Whether the little horse, one of the most valuable with the circus, will recover is problematical.—Medford Tribune.

MAN WHO CAPTURED TRACEY IS DYING

The following dispatch to the Portland Journal from Denver will be of interest to many who remember Tracey, the outlaw, who escaped from the state penitentiary of Oregon:

One of the bravest of the old time officers of the west, E. A. Farnham, of Steamboat Springs, is dying at St. Luke's hospital. His condition is so serious that a telegram has been sent to his wife asking her to make haste to Denver.

It was Mr. Farnham more than anyone else who succeeded in finally riding Brown's Park of its gang of outlaws. He captured single-handed the outlaw Harry Tracey after Tracey had murdered Valentine Hoy. Tracey afterwards escaped from prison, and in his efforts to avoid arrest killed seven or eight men of the posse who followed him in a perilous hunt through Oregon and Washington. Finally Tracey was surrounded in a wheat field a few miles from Spokane and killed himself in the night by sending a bullet through his brain.

Farnham has lived in Routt county for a quarter of a century, and his name has been a terror to "bad men." Brown's Park, which is the extreme northwestern corner of Colorado, and adjoins the "hole in the wall" country, where "Butch" Cassidy and his gang so long made their headquarters, was the scene of many of Farnham's exploits. He had no fear, and Cassidy never attempted to cross the line into this state as long as Farnham was the peace officer of Routt county.

Many stories could be told of Farnham's bravery. He was a man of few words and slow to anger, but of great determination. The Hoy, who were among the oldest settlers in the county and of great respectability, were among his closest friends. Valentine Hoy was killed by Harry Tracey at a watering hole because Tracey, who was then an outlaw, with a price upon his head, feared that Hoy would cause his arrest. Farnham took up the chase at once and did not stop until Tracey's capture. L. C. Hoy, the brother, still lives on the Routt county ranch.
