The Republican state convention of Mississippi at Jacksonville split into two factions and the police had to quell the disturbance with drawn guns. Finally the "regulars" endorsed President Roosevelt, while the bolters elected delegates instructed for Foraker.

WILLIAMS POKES FUN AT UNCLE JOE CANNON

Washington, April 29.—Williams presented a petition signed by 164 of the 166 Democrats composing the majority, and asking the speaker to reinstate some of the members of the House to move a discharge of the ways and means committee from any further hearing of the Stevens bill for the removal of the duty on wood pulp and print paper and to pass that bill or a similar one.

Williams said that the only reason he did not have all the Democrats on the petition was that two of them were out of town, but he promised to round them up as soon as they returned. He said that only thirty Republicans were necessary to make the requisite number to pass the bill, and declared that it should be easy to get them together because almost thirty Republicans have introduced free paper bills, "and," he said, "I know every one of you who introduced a bill meant what you said."

He quoted the line from the old hymn, "While the lamp holds out to burn the vilest sinner may return."

Williams proceeded in a manner he ridiculed, why, think for a second—think what a short life we have here and how important it is that we should live in this brief day of our time.

I express the hope that thirty of you may sign the petition because my name is on it and the names of Champ Clark, Dearmond, Underwood and Gaines and all these vile publicans and sinners on this side, get up one of your own, I pray you. We can add the two together. If thirty of you sign the speaker cannot refuse you. Together we will then constitute a majority of the House of Representatives. Early in the session when the rules were being adopted, the speaker was asked if the majority of the House made a request to the speaker whether the request would be heeded, and his reply, as I remember it, was: "The majority of the House will always be heeded by the speaker."

"So, if you put thirty names to our 166 and constitute 196, a majority of the House, I know that the eminently good-natured man who presides over the House, so tolerant of opposition, so patient whenever there is a stumbling block athwart his pathway, will bow in his most elegant manner, with gesture peculiar of him, and say, 'Gentlemen, the majority of the representatives of the American people have a right to have their say and I will recognize somebody.'"

CONSTRUCTION CREW MAY RESUME WORK TOMORROW

The Japanese construction crew which was at work on the Eugene depot yard improvements and was laid off last night upon orders from headquarters at Portland, may resume work tomorrow. The regular session crew was also laid off and the members do not know the reason, but all are of the opinion that tomorrow being the first of the month they will be put back to work. Each division is allowed a certain amount of money for improvements each month. It is thought that the money allowed for this division for April had been exhausted and the men were stopped for today, as there would be no money with which to pay them until the beginning of a new month.

Oregon received one hundred more colonists during the week ending April 27 this year than arrived the corresponding seven days last year, according to figures compiled by the local Harman traffic officials. The total for the week just reported is 1222; for last year it was 1122. The communities in Southern Oregon are getting the lion's share of this year's "homesteaders' business," due probably to the effective publicity campaign which have been waged during the past year. Points south of Portland secured 271, Portland direct 244, and the balance was distributed in smaller numbers throughout the Northwest.—Telegram.

Sunday's baseball game at Springfield between Springfield and Albany promises to be the best yet played there this spring. Albany will have in its line-up a number of the old stars of the State League of several years ago, and Springfield will have its usual strong line-up.
