SENATOR JEFF DAVIS DENOUNCES PLUTOCRATIC PRESS

Washington, April 29.—In the senate today Senator Davis of Arkansas moved to discharge the committee on the Judiciary from the further consideration of his bill "For the suppression of trusts, pools and combinations in trade." He spoke for about two hours, reading much of the time from a typewritten statement which he had prepared in advance, "that no intemperate language might escape his lips on this occasion," a thing which he said he had never done before.

During his speech he roundly denounced trusts, commended the press methods employed by the Electric Boat company, directed by the house of representatives, is ended so far as open sessions of the special committee are concerned. The closing hours were dramatic. Frederick Brown Whitney, lawyer, admitted he was the author of the anonymous letters of February 13 and February 15 to a representative of the Detroit Free Press, and State Senator Edinborough of Michigan, which have figured so prominently in the investigation.

ALLEGED POSTOFFICE ROBBER ARRESTED

Roseburg, Or., April 30.—Discovery in his trunk of a tobacco pouch full of 1-cent pieces led to the arrest yesterday of Claude Hendricks on suspicion of being the person who robbed the postoffice and general store at Brockway, eight miles north of Roseburg, last Thursday night. The booty from the robbery consisted of about \$100 in money, stamps and merchandise. Of the money there were two pounds of ancient pieces. In addition to the finding of the coppers, the officers have secured evidence against Hendricks dealing with his movements about the time of the robbery. Two months ago Hendricks was acquitted of the charge of the larceny of a watch near this city. Since that time he has been absent from the county until he appeared at the home of relatives near Brockway the day after the robbery. Postal inspectors Clement and Riehes, of Portland, happened to be in Roseburg when Hendricks was arrested, and will now assist in prosecuting the case against him.

The Oregon baseball team won four games straight last week on a tour through the Willamette Valley with the leading teams. The Salem high school put up a twelve inning contest Friday afternoon, the varsity team winning finally, 3 to 2. On Saturday morning, the team won from the Indians at Chemawa, 10 to 1, and in the afternoon beat Willamette, 11 to 4. Henkle, the freshman southpaw, pitched the last two games, Clifford the one on Friday.

FOUR-MASTED GERMAN VESSEL IN SERIOUS PLIGHT

New York, May 1.—The German four-masted ship Pater Rikman ashore at Beach's inlet, loaded by fully, and the sea are breaking over her. Lifesavers have not yet been sent. She went ashore last night. The Rikmaners left New York yesterday, bound for Rangoon with oil, worth \$5000. The vessel is valued at \$60,000. Owing to the sea all efforts of the floating crew to reach her have been unsuccessful. The Rikmaners could not be rescued. The vessel is stranded. Before dawn the gale veered, blowing off shore and all sails were set in the hope of a tide race. A revenue cutter and wrecking party have been sent from New York, and it is believed the crew is in no immediate danger.
