STOLEN GOODS FROM BOOK STORE FOUND

The Portland, Eugene & Eastern crew, working on the Eugene-Springfield extension of the company's electric railway, this forenoon found beneath a pile of ties at Judkins' Point a quantity of goods evidently stolen from a book store. There were four dozen penholders, four writing tablets and two story books, all new. The goods were taken to the Fairmount store and the officers notified, but so far as known none of the book stores in Eugene have been burglarized recently. Hobbs passing along the S. P. track there no doubt hid the articles, not being able to dispose of them for money.

WORK ON SPRINGFIELD LINE GOING AHEAD

The Portland, Eugene & Eastern construction crew is now working on a big fill for the Eugene-Springfield line at Judkins' Point and will soon have the grade from the end of the line in Fairmount to the point completed. As soon as the rails for the line arrive—they are expected any day—work of laying track will begin and will be completed as soon as possible so that materials for the long trestle across the bottom at the Campbell hop yard can be hauled over the line. L. N. Honey is setting up his pile driver to begin the work of driving the piles for the trestle as soon as they are delivered, which will be in a few days.

MEXICAN WAR VETERAN DIES AT ROSEBURG

Roseburg, Or., April 30.—Sergeant Robert S. Dunlap, one of the few remaining survivors of the Mexican war, one of Oregon's oldest Masons and a pioneer of Jackson county, died at the Soldiers' Home in this city yesterday at the age of 89 years. The funeral will be held at the Home tomorrow under the auspices of the Roseburg Masonic lodge. In the Mexican war Mr. Dunlap served as a sergeant in the First Missouri Volunteers. In the early 50s he settled at Jacksonville, Or., where he resided continuously until 1894, when he was admitted to the Soldiers' Home. For 21 years Sergeant Dunlap was the wiper of Warren's edge of Masons at Jacksonville. He leaves relatives in Jackson county and in Portland.
