## SEEKS TO ANNUL ILLEGAL MARRIAGE CONTRACT

### MRS. HILTABIDDLE SAYS SHE DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS ILLEGAL TO MARRY WITHIN SIX MONTHS AFTER BEING DI- VORCED

Mrs. Carrie L. Hiltabiddle today began suit in the circuit court against William Lane, asking the court to annul the pretended marriage contract entered into by them in Eugene on August 29, 1902. Mrs. Hiltabiddle alleges in her complaint that on April 14, 1902, she began suit against David Hiltabiddle for divorce, and that the decree was granted June 17. She was married to Lane only a little over two months after being divorced, not knowing that the marriage would be illegal until after six months had elapsed from the time the divorce was granted. She alleges that as soon as she learned that the marriage was not legal she left Lane and has since been living separate and apart from him. J. G. Wells is attorney for the plaintiff.

## GREAT LOCKOUT OF WORKINGMEN IN ENGLAND

Glasgow, May 2.—Clyde shipbuilders today locked out six thousand workmen. This measure is the outcome of a dispute between the shipbuilding employers' federation and the shipworkers of the northeast coast, who struck rather than accept a reduction of wages, and who have not been able to get the federation to arbitrate their demands. Lockouts have been decided upon by all shipbuilding yards of the United Kingdom, and the workmen in other branches will gradually be locked out.

There seems to be a prospect of a complete stoppage of the shipbuilding industry, a condition that will affect directly not less than 250,000 men.
