ROOM FOR CROWDS AT ROSE FESTIVAL

Address preparation of the information bureau of the rose festival was begun in the office on the fifth floor of the Seveland building this morning, says the Portland Telegram. The bureau will arrange for accommodations for all visitors who expect to visit Portland during the week of the big celebration, June 1-6. Preparations will be made to take care of an extra population of 100,000 for the week, and to do it without trouble, inconvenience or confusion to the strangers who will want the comforts of bed and board during their stay.

Plans have been provided which will be sent broadcast to any point from which people may apply for such accommodations. The prospective visitor need only to notify the festival committee how many days he will be here, how many days there will be in the party, and how much the visitor desires to pay for room, with or without board.

The application will be placed on file and the record will be kept in such a way that when the visitors begin pouring in they can go directly to the place assigned to them and have no further trouble. This will be done without cost to out-of-town visitors. They will be able to secure accommodations in first-class hotels, moderate-priced hotels, apartment and lodging houses, boarding houses and in private residences, at prices to suit their own purses.

HARRIMAN'S MEN AT PELICAN BAY

Klamath Falls, Or., May 4.—Work has already commenced on the improvement at Pelican bay, owned by E. H. Harriman on upper Klamath lake. A pumping plant has been installed and hot and cold water will be available in every cottage. A cold storage plant will also be erected. J. S. Holabird, brother of Colonel W. H. Holabird, of Los Angeles, who entertained the Harriman party last summer, is in charge of the improvements. Colonel Holabird, who is now in Mexico, is expected to arrive here the latter part of May to take personal charge of the resort.

CITY DADS HAVE ANOTHER MEETING LAST EVENING

COMMUNICATION FROM ATTORNEY FOR WILLAMETTE COMPANY READ, STATING THAT PLANT CANNOT BE TURNED OVER TILL MONEY OR BONDS ARE PAID

The city council held an adjourned session last night at the council chambers with a full board present. Various matters were discussed and acted upon, among which was that of the transfer of the water plant from the Willamette Valley Company to the city. A communication from A. C. Woodcock, attorney for the company, was read. He stated that it would not be good business policy to turn the plant over to the city before the money is secured or the bonds are given the company in payment. He stated further that the property is now held in trust, by a trust deed, and it could not be turned over until the consent of the trustee was obtained.

Contracts covering the transfer of the property were submitted to the council by Mr. Woodcock, who was present, and they were referred to the committee of the whole, which will meet tonight.

Routine Matters. The petition asking the street railway company to move its track on Alder street to A street was reported unfavorably by the committee to which it was referred. The report was adopted.

The matter of a new sidewalk on the south side of East Thirtieth street from Alder street to University avenue was referred.

The fire and water committee recommended that an arc light be established at the corner of West Eleventh and Washington streets.

The improvement of Alder street from East Eleventh street to the mill race was ordered.

City Attorney Bean was ordered to draw an ordinance providing for a plumbing inspector and defining his duties. He was also ordered to draw an ordinance prohibiting the cutting of the pavement only on a proper permit. An amendment to the dog license ordinance was ordered drawn, providing a license of \$2.50 for males and \$3 for females.

An ordinance prohibiting the using of sidewalks by bicycles on any paved street was also ordered drawn.

At the close of the meeting the council met as a committee of the whole to discuss the question of securing water from Ritchie creek for a gravity system.
