WEEKLY BULLETIN ON WEATHER CONDITIONS

Following is a report of the Western Oregon weather conditions for the week ending Monday, May 4, as reported by the weather bureau at Portland:

General Summary. The fore part of the week was clear. During this period the maximum temperatures were unseasonably high, owing to the uninterrupted sunshine. The minimum temperatures were usually correspondingly low, owing to the effects of radiation, and frosts were of frequent occurrence. On Friday there was a decided change to cool and cloudy weather, which continued during the remainder of the week. In the counties west of the Cascade mountains moderate rains fell, but in the eastern counties the recorded amounts were light. High winds blew at times, especially on Saturday.

Coast District. Doraville, Columbia county.—The week was generally warm and pleasant. Unseasonably warm weather prevailed on Wednesday and Thursday.

Marshfield, Coos county.—Fair and warmer weather prevailed during the fore part of the week, but the latter part was cool and showery.

Fairview, Coos county.—Clear weather prevailed all week except on Friday, which was cloudy and threatening. During the afternoon a heavy rain fell. A light frost occurred on Tuesday.

Port Orford, Curry county.—This week was generally fair. A fog prevailed on Thursday morning.

Willamette Valley. Portland, Multnomah county.—Clear and unseasonably warm weather prevailed until Friday, after which it was cloudy and cool.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The week was generally mild and the rainfall light. A severe freeze occurred on Wednesday night.

Salem, Marion county.—The weather was clear until Friday, with frosty nights. Light rains fell on Friday and Saturday, accompanied by high winds.

Corvallis, Benton county.—The fore part of the week was clear, with unseasonably high temperatures. Friday and Saturday were cold and showery, with high winds.

Eugene, Lane county.—The weather was warm and clear during the fore part of the week, but the latter part was cold, cloudy and rainy, with high winds from the south and southwest.

Bull Run, Clackamas county.—The weather was clear until Friday, when it turned cloudy.

DIED

At the Eugene hospital Tuesday evening, May 5, 1908, James Henry Belknap, aged 81 years, from a complication of diseases.

Mr. Belknap was one of the Lane county pioneers and was the last of the old settlers of the upper McKenzie river, his home being for many years at Belknap's bridge, a few miles this side of McKenzie Bridge. His father was the discoverer of Belknap Springs, which are situated ten or twelve miles above the old Belknap homestead.

Deceased was born in Vermont. When only four years old he came with his parents via the Isthmus of Panama to Southern Oregon, where they settled on the Rogue river and his father served as a volunteer in the Rogue River Indian war, his mother acting as nurse. When he was 22 years old they moved from Josephine county to the upper McKenzie valley.

He was married to Miss Ella Finn at Gatz Creek October 1, 1873, who has been a faithful helpmeet and companion. Besides his wife he leaves the following children, all of whom live in Lane county: Bird, Mrs. Alice Odell, of Waltherville; Arthur, who lives on the home place; Mrs. Cora Inman, of Waltherville; Miss Clara, Mrs. Eida Trotter, of Marcola, and Clarence. He also leaves the following sisters: Mrs. Dora Simms, of the upper McKenzie; Mrs. Fred Peplot, of the lower Siuslaw county, and Mrs. Lockwood, of Canyon City, Grant county, Oregon. He was a member of the Order of Washington, carrying an insurance policy in the order for \$1000.

The funeral will be held at Leaburg Tuesday at 2 p. m., with interment in the Waltherville cemetery.

SENATOR FULTON WORKING FOR CAKE

Portland, Or., May 5.—To help Taft and Calkins, Senator C. W. Fulton has sent his private secretary, C. W. Halderman, of Astoria, to open headquarters. These were opened this morning at Rooms 604 and 605 at the Imperial hotel. Taft and Fulton are personal friends and the senator wants to do all he can to assist the secretary of war in lining up a Chicago delegation.

Fulton's headquarters will also do whatever possible to promote the interests of Calkins. This is a combination which is favorable to Fulton's friends, and when the headquarters opened this morning a number of ardent Fulton people called to learn in what way they could be of assistance.

It is not intended by Fulton to dictate the politics of the state in opening headquarters for Taft, says his secretary, but rather to help his friend Taft, and to do what he can for Calkins. Fulton himself will probably be back in time for the June election, in which he will vote and speak for Calkins.

The Fulton-Taft-Calkins headquarters are on the same floor as the Mulkey-Taft headquarters, and while each is working in the interest of Taft, they are not co-operating.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, there was submitted to the people of the city of Eugene, Oregon, at a special election for that purpose on the 18th day of April, 1908, an initiative proposal after being ordained by the Common Council, pursuant to and in accordance with the general laws of the state of Oregon, for amending sections 108 and 112 of the charter of said city, and whereas there was at the same time submitted to the people of said city for their approval or rejection an initiative proposal to amend the charter of said city by adding a section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto within the city, or the burial of human bodies therein, except under certain conditions, and whereas the votes cast at said election having been this 20th day of April, 1908, duly canvassed and determined and the said amendment of said sections 108 and 112 as aforesaid having carried by an affirmative vote of 667 as against 171 negative votes thereon.

Now, therefore, I, J. D. Matlock, mayor of said city of Eugene, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor, do hereby proclaim, announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast for and against said proposed amendments are as stated above, and that said amendments received an affirmative majority of all votes cast and that said proposed amendments, from the date hereof, be and the same are in full force and effect as a law of the city of Eugene, and a part of the charter of said city.

That said proposed amendment of the charter by adding an additional section thereto forbidding the establishment of cemeteries or additions thereto failed to receive a majority of the votes cast thereon and thereby failed to become a law of said city or a part of the charter thereof.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this 20th day of April, 1908, and caused the seal of said city to be hereunto affixed.
