WATER BOND ISSUE AUTHORIZED BY COUNCIL

Another adjourned meeting of the city council was held last night, at which time the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the \$300,000 water bonds in denominations of from \$100 to \$1000 was unanimously passed. A description of the bonds is contained in the notice for their sale, published in another column of today's Guard.

The matter of moving the Cyclone Hose Company's house back to the rear part of the lot was reported adversely by the committee to which it was referred.

The city attorney was instructed to draft an ordinance requiring merchants to give full weight in selling their wares.

The building ordinance amendment was passed and adopted.

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ELLIOTT IMPLICATES SMITH IN CONFESSION

Prineville, Or., May 5.—In an affidavit covering three typewritten pages, now in possession of the Crook county authorities, Larin Elliott, the stockman jointly indicted with former Sheriff C. Sam Smith on two charges of arson, of exposing poison with intent to kill ex-Congressman J. N. Williamson's sheep and of cutting barbed wire fences on the property of Charles Altschul, leased by Williamson, makes a number of sensational allegations.

Admitting his own guilt, he accuses Smith of being the leading spirit in the crimes and implicates Stanley Smith, the 14-year-old son of the latter in the wire-cutting. He alleges, moreover, that Smith tried to induce him to take part in placing dynamite under Williamson's house in Prineville, with the intention of dealing out to the former congressman and his family the same terrible fate that befell ex-Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, and ex-Sheriff Brown, of Baker County.

Elliott has promised to testify along the line of his affidavit when placed on the witness stand at the trial of Smith, which will probably be Thursday. He made his confession April 14, when taken into custody by Sheriff Frank Elkins. At that time the only evidence in possession of the authorities was a broken bridle rein, identified as belonging to Elliott, which was found near the demolished wire fence, and the fact that the footprints of two unshod horses had been trailed from the scene of the incendiarism to within a quarter of a mile of Smith's ranch home. Should the testimony of Elliott be impeached in any appreciable measure, it is eminently asserted that the state will lose its case.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of an act "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
