## CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTING WATER SYSTEM

F. C. KELSAY EMPLOYED AS CONSULTING ENGINEER AND McCLAIN & McARTHUR TO DO WORK

PRELIMINARY SURVEY OF RITCHIE AND OTHER CREEKS TO BEGIN AT ONCE—KELSAY AND McCLAIN & McARTHUR ARE EACH TO RECEIVE TWO PER CENT OF ACTUAL COST OF SYSTEM

At a meeting of the city council in committee of the whole last night the engineering firm of McArthur & McClain was given the job of constructing the city's pipe line from Ritchie creek, and F. C. Kelsay, of Portland, was employed as consulting engineer. Contracts are being drawn up today and the work of making the preliminary survey will probably begin tomorrow and will be rushed to completion.

McArthur & McClain are University of Oregon students and have been engaged in similar work for several years, among their contracts being the construction of the sewer system at Springfield, which was entirely satisfactory to the people of that city. Their work of constructing the pipe line for the new gravity waterworks will be entirely under the supervision of Engineer Kelsay, who will furnish all the plans and specifications for the work, and who will stake out the pipe line and give his personal attention to the work until it is completed. Mr. Kelsay, it will be remembered, was employed by the city council a couple of years ago to furnish plans and specifications for a municipal water system, when the question was first agitated, and there was considerable trouble in collecting his fee from the city, but it finally resulted in his securing the entire amount asked for. The matter of going ahead with the plant was held up from time to time, but it now appears as if the long-cherished plans of the municipal ownership adherents are soon to be carried out.

Contract Signed. The fire and water committee of the council and Mayor Matlock and City Attorney Bean, to whom the matter of drawing up the contract was referred, met in the office of the city attorney this forenoon and formulated the contract. It was drawn up and late this afternoon signed. The terms as agreed upon in the contract in brief are as follows: Engineer Kelsay is to make the preliminary surveys of Ritchie creek and two or three other creeks to ascertain whether or not sufficient water can be secured from them. This work is to be commenced at once and completed within ten days. McClain & McArthur are to be employed by Kelsay to do the actual surveying work. If the survey proves these streams will furnish all the water desired, Kelsay's employment is to be continued as consulting engineer until the completion of the construction work and he is to make all plans and specifications. For the first or preliminary survey he is to receive \$250, and if the report is accepted he is to be paid for his entire work a sum equal to 2 per cent of the actual cost of the plant. The first payment is to be made at the time the final surveys are completed, and at the submission of the approximate cost of the plant. This payment is to be one-half of one per cent of the cost. When full detail plans and specifications are completed he is to receive a like payment, and for his services for supervising the contract during the construction work he will be paid one per cent in ten installments.

McClain & McArthur are employed as resident engineers to do the actual construction work on the ground and to furnish Kelsay with surveys and details. They are to be paid the same price and in the same manner that Kelsay is to be paid.

The committee reserves the right to cancel the contract at any time and if done before any of the steps mentioned are completed the engineers shall be paid only for the work accomplished, except it is agreed that Kelsay shall be paid the \$250 for the preliminary work. The contract is of course conditional upon the sale of the \$300,000 bonds recently voted.

## SEATTLE MAN WAS PROFESSIONAL PRIZE FIGHTER

Portland, May 7.—In a special dispatch to the Evening Telegram from Juneau, Alaska, Henry Croft, who was entered as an amateur by the Seattle Amateur Athletic Club for the heavy-weight championship in the recent boxing and wrestling tournament held in Portland to decide the amateur championship of the Pacific coast, and who won the championship from Edward Johnson, of the Multnomah Athletic Club, is alleged to be a professional. He is alleged to have fought Nick Burley, a well-known professional, at Dawson City five years ago, and participated in fights all over Alaska. He is said to be a son of Johnny Carroll, an old-time professional prize fighter who resides at San Francisco, and whose son, Jimmy Carroll, has earned quite a reputation in the prize ring. Supporters of Johnson in the contest with "Croft" are reported to have lost \$2000 in bets to the supporters of the alleged "ringer."

## HAMMOND ARRIVES HOME WITH PARMENTER

Deputy Sheriff C. C. Hammond arrived home from Omaha, Neb., this afternoon, bringing with him David Parmenter, the old man who forfeited his bond at the last regular term of circuit court, which he had put up for his appearance for trial on the charge of polygamy. It will be remembered that Parmenter was located in Omaha nearly two weeks ago and was arrested there. Deputy Hammond says after he was arrested he was released as there is no law in Nebraska against polygamy, bigamy being the term designated by the law in that state. He was arrested again, however, for being a fugitive from justice, and held until the deputy's arrival. Parmenter will be tried at a special term of court to be held soon.

## CORNER RESIDENCE LOT SOLD FOR \$6500

J. P. Campbell, United States deputy marshal for Alaska, who was recently in Eugene visiting at the home of Hon. I. H. Bingham, has bought the I. F. Bianton corner at Thirtieth and Willamette streets for \$6500. He will move his family here next fall and place his sons in the University of Oregon. Later he may erect a handsome residence there. A new cement sidewalk is now being laid in front of the property. The Eugene Real Estate and Investment Company made the sale.
