clock. The identification was shortly before midnight. Detectives were at once sent to make a search of the vacant lot. The coat and vest, worn by him when he left his home Friday morning, were still missing.

The articles were found by Paul Stark Lytle. The lot, between Montgomery and Harrison streets, on Water street, is on his property, and he was attracted by a broken old coat, he walked up to the vehicle and inspected the bed. The glint of a rifle barrel caught his eye, and he drew the rifle out. The coat lay on the stock.

A lighted match revealed the character of his find and the officer hurried to the police station. Here a close inspection was made of the coat. The breast was spattered with blood, while the right sleeve was

literally dyed crimson. Broad red smears appeared on the right shoulder and lapel. The coat was of a light material and showed the stains plainly.

In Trouble at Tacoma
Vancouver, Wash., May 6.—Edward H. Martin, arrested in Portland on the charge of murdering Nathan Wolff, a Portland pawnbroker, has a police record in this city and curiously enough was arrested for robbing the safe of M. Clow, a local pawnbroker. From the varied story told the Vancouver police by Martin, Chief Sceriat, of the local force, believes Martin likely to deny the charge of murder in the face of the most incriminating evidence. It was partly through a description of the man furnished the Portland authorities by Sceriat, who knew him well, that his capture was effected yesterday.

Martin's trial was to come up before the superior court on a charge of grand larceny, but through the influence of his wife and friends the charge was reduced to petty larceny and Martin pleaded guilty and was fined \$50, this amount being paid by his wife. After his experience here Martin soon left town and has not yet been seen by the local authorities.

house for a band of murderers who shipped the bodies of their victims there for burial. The entire farmyard is being dug up in the search and the officers are confident that they will find several more skeletons.

Three Men disappear
Mrs. Cristoferson, who lived near the Gunness family, told the sheriff today that a year ago she saw a strange man, wearing a fur overcoat, enter the Gunness home. He became Mrs. Gunness' hired man, but later disappeared. After his disappearance Mrs. Gunness wore the fur overcoat, explaining that the man had given it to her.

Shortly afterward, Mrs. Cristoferson stated, a large man wearing a heavy red mustache appeared at the Gunness home. Three weeks later he disappeared. Mrs. Gunness stating that he had answered one of her matrimonial advertisements, but did not suit and left.

Two weeks later a lumberman who was reported to have been a lumberman from Wisconsin, went to the Gunness place—and he disappeared a few days later—Mrs. Gunness explaining that she had dismissed him upon learning that he had two children, one of whom was a cripple.

The officers are confident that the three men were murdered and that their bodies will be dug up on the farm.
