ATTORNEY GIVES EVIDENCE THAT MAY FREE MARTIN

since made—and the fact that he said to have borrowed a revolver from the afternoon previous to the shooting of Wolff. Also he has a valuable watch in Wolff's shop which he took, together with what cash was in the drawer at the time of the shooting.

Martin either explains or denies the incriminating fact that has been produced against him.

Claims Complete Alibi

He claimed this morning that he had a complete alibi, in proving that his wife will be a witness; that he bought three shirts, but that he bought for all three of them, and that his wife can or will tell where they are; that the collar found in Wolff's shop was of a make and of such as he never wore; that it was instead of a 1 1/2-2—his size—that the collar and necktie he wore on Friday night last are the same as he wore when arrested—a white collar and a black and white striped necktie.

He has the entire alibi completely declared Martin this morning. Attorney, Senator Gearin, has asked me to talk, but I can say only that I was supposed to be on the evening at the time Wolff was shot. Furthermore, I can prove every charge they have made against me in this case is false."

It is quite probable that Mrs. Martin is a witness for her husband when he is tried. Martin's allusions made in his cell this morning are extremely affectionate. He demonstrated that there had been an arrangement at all, and said that she had not kissed him the day of his arrest was that she had been interposed and prevented from speaking to him. He said that their interview yesterday had been affectionate in the extreme and that she had kissed him when he went away.

JUDGE CORNELL IS STRICKEN WITH PARALYSIS

Judge Wilbur F. Cornell, one of the pioneer miners of Fortymile, was brought to Dawson Saturday, and is in the Good Samaritan hospital, suffering from a touch of paralysis. The judge is an elderly man, and during the winter was attacked with paralysis while living in his cabin alone. He nearly froze to death and saved his life by firing a revolver to attract attention of men across the river. With one of the last cartridges he succeeded in calling attention to himself. Even then the man hearing the shot was only suspicious of something being wrong, and did not know the true cause of alarm until after making an investigation.—Dawson Daily News, April 15.

Judge Cornell is an old newspaper man, well-known in Oregon, his wife being matron at the insane asylum, and a nephew is a member of the U. of O. faculty.

DIAMOND IMPORTERS SHOW BUSINESS IMPROVING

New York, May 7.—As an indication of the rising commercial tide the diamond importers are pointing to the figures for recent importations. The custom-house records show that precious stones valued at \$483,062 were brought into this country in April, as against \$389,514 in March and \$260,443 in February. The value of the most recent stones imported in April was \$265,821, or nearly half that of the corresponding month last year. One of the importers says that prices are as high as when the market was active.

owned by Dr. R. R. Car, of LaPorte. Larson believes that the bones found are those of people buried by the physician, and the authorities are trying to ascertain if Car had a private burying ground on the place.

More Bodies Found

LaPorte, May 8.—Two more bodies were turned up by the diggers in the Guinness charnel farm today, one that of a man and the other is supposed to be that of a woman. Both skeletons had been articulated. Thus far only three of the eleven bodies have been identified.

Jennie Olson, the sixteen-year-old foster daughter of Mrs. Guinness; Andrew Hegelin, of Mansfield, S. D., and Ole O. Budsborg, of Iola, Wis.

Justice Kincaid stated today that in the trial of Roy Lamphere, one week before the burning of the home of Mrs. Guinness, who had Lamphere arrested for trespass, she was questioned as to the death of her two husbands, and was asked point blank if they were insured. The woman was composed, but suddenly began to tremble. Kincaid believes she fled and committed suicide, fearing exposure of her mode of life. On the advice of her lawyer she refused to answer the questions.

Daughter is in Hiding.

Janesville, Wis., May 8.—Swan Hilda Guinness, daughter of the second husband of Mrs. Guinness, is hidden near here by relatives. She was kidnapped from the Guinness place and brought here for safety by an uncle, and soon will be taken to claim the estate for her.

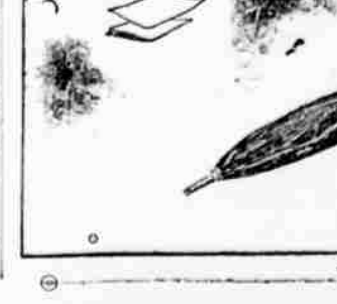
PRINCE ARRESTED FOR DEPRAVED ACTS

BRODERS' REFRIGERATOR PLANT ARRIVES

Broders Bros. this morning received their five-ton refrigerating plant from Portland, and it will at once be installed in their meat market on West Eighth street. The compressor will be located in the rear part of the building, and pipes will be run all through the two refrigerator boxes, which are each 17x25 feet in dimensions. They expect to have the plant in operation in a week or ten days. This is a new departure in Eugene, heretofore the butchers keeping their meats cold in the summer time by a frequent supply of ice from the local factory.

JONES AND CRAIG BROUGHT BACK

Sheriff Fred Fisk arrived home on the midnight train last night with St. Jones and Fred Craig, who are accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, Addie Watts. They were arraigned before Judge Bryson, of the justice court, this forenoon. They both demanded an examination and it was set for next Tuesday at 9:30 a. m. Their bonds were fixed at \$500 each, but neither was able to furnish bail up to a late hour and they are still in the county jail. The sheriff says he had no trouble with the boys on their way from Heppner to Eugene.

CLEVELAND TRUST CONCERN INSOLVENT

Cleveland, May 8.—The Euclid Trust Company today made an assignment to the Cleveland Trust Co. in the insolvency court. No statement of assets or liabilities is given, but in the last statement issued there were \$1,700,000 of liabilities and the same amount of assets.
