RAPID EXTENSION OF TROLLEY LINES

The construction of electric lines is an important factor in the development of the territory traversed. When it is considered that electric traction has been developed within a little over a quarter of a century it is an amazing evidence of expansion that the trolley now almost gridles the earth, says a California exchange.
