INDEPENDENT 'PHONE COMPANY INVADING FIELD

DE LANCY-VARNEY COMPANY ASKS FOR FRANCHISE AT JUNCTION—UNLESS PACIFIC STATES MAKES IMPROVEMENTS APPLICATION WILL BE GRANTED.

The DeLancy-Varney company, known as the Independent line, has applied to the city council for a charter to operate their system at this place. The application was laid over for investigation. Opposition is supposed to be the life of trade, but there are exceptions in all cases and this is one of them. Two systems will prove burdensome, especially to business houses as they would naturally be forced to patronize both systems. This company offers no other inducements for a franchise than that given by the Pacific States. This new company has headquarters at Corvallis and Benton county is equipped with this service and we are informed that the service is superior to that given by the Pacific States. The Commercial club has submitted a proposition to the Pacific States Co. asking certain concessions and with these, if granted, a chance to get a foothold. We are supplied with a lot of old hand-me-down phones that should be replaced with modern central force phones, that is, when the receiver is taken down, central is called. The service can also be greatly improved and the rate considerably reduced, besides this, patrons should have free use of the wires in the entire county.

The funeral ceremonies of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman were noteworthy for their rare simplicity. It is said that a state funeral in Westminster Abbey has seldom, perhaps never, been so slight in ritual. There was sung Parcell's setting of the Ninetieth Psalm. "Lord, Thou hast been our dwelling place through all generations." Samuel Wesley's anthem, "All go unto your place," and Dr. Goss' "I heard a voice," and Mr. Ford of the New York Tribune "Dean Robinson and Archbishop Wiberforce read the lesson and prayers as unaffectedly as if they were conducting a village funeral. Yet it was a profoundly affecting service, as was proved when the grand hymn sung at Gladstone's fun-

eral was repeated with many signs of emotion by the vast concourse in abbey, the archbishop of Canterbury and other high dignitaries as they stood beside the bier. Mr. Clemenceau's presence, being without precedent in the annals of Anglo-French relations, was the unique feature of the final honors paid to the liberal leader. It lighted up the historic scene of national mourning with the spirit of international good will.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
