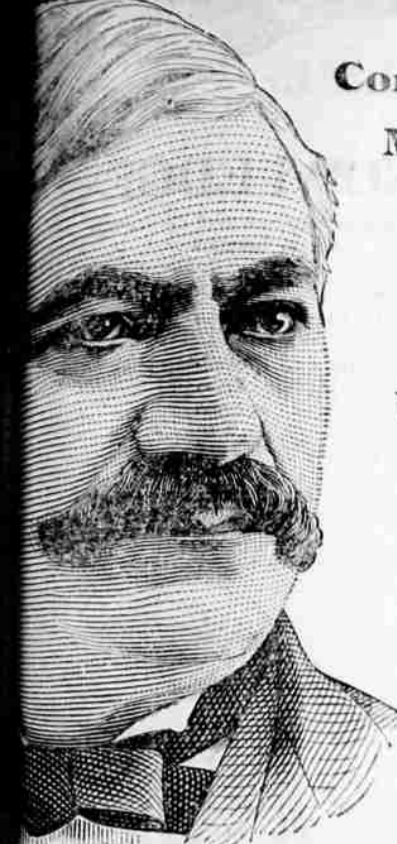

TAFT CHOICE OF REPUBLICANS IN CONVENTION

TAFT AND ENTIRE TICKET NOMINATED AT PRIMARIES ENDORSED AT PRIMARIES ENDORSED—CONVENTION SYSTEM IS APPROVED AND ONE WILL BE HELD BEFORE PRIMARIES TWO YEARS HENCE

The Lane county Republican convention met at 2:30 this afternoon and unanimously resolved, amid great enthusiasm, to instruct their delegates to the state convention at Portland to vote for national delegates instructed for Taft as the Republican candidate for president at the Chicago convention. There was no opposition of any kind, not a single vote against the resolution.

In two other resolutions, also unanimously passed, Wm. H. Calkins received the hearty endorsement of the convention for United States senator, and the Republican ticket nominated at the recent primaries was pledged the support of the convention at the coming general election in June.

The present plan of nominating candidates by the primary system seemed unsatisfactory to a good part of the convention, and a resolution was unanimously determined upon by which a Republican convention will be called in the first week of March, 1910, to recommend nominees to the Republican voters of the county. It was also incorporated in this resolution, after some discussion, to prohibit proxies being voted except by members to the convention from the same precinct that the proxies represented.

Amid great applause on the part of every delegate another resolution was passed heartily endorsing the appropriation for the University of Oregon and not only endorsing the work of the institution, but pledging each member to work for the measure. When the resolution came to a vote there was not a single dissenting "no."

About 175 prominent Republicans were present from all over the county. Hon. R. S. Bryson was elected secretary and S. L. Moorehead, of Junction City, presided. State Senator Frank J. Miller, of Albany, made an address at the beginning of the convention, and S. M. Yoran followed with a forty-minute talk broken by frequent applause. By the time he had finished the committee on resolutions were ready to report, each resolution, as it was read by Dr. W. Kuykendall, chairman of the committee, being voted upon, and in each case being unanimously passed.

Delegates. The convention in Portland will be held on Thursday, May 14. Twelve delegates were selected to the state convention, which will choose eight of Oregon's national delegation of twelve, and twelve others for the district convention which chooses two delegates for this district, the other two being chosen by the second congressional district.

The delegates for the district convention are: S. L. Moorehead, T. C. Wheeler, W. F. Watker, G. H. Kelly, W. G. Griffin, S. B. Eakin, J. M. Williams, H. W. Thompson, A. L. Briggs, John Martin, F. J. Hard, W. S. Moen.

The delegates from Lane county to the state convention were elected by ballot as follows: W. Kuykendall, S. M. Yoran, C. H. Vandenberg, L. H. Potter, W. G. Gilstrap, I. N. Edwards, J. B. Bell, J. M. Shelley, D. A. Paine, S. H. Friendly, J. L. Jones, C. Cole.

POWERS FILES SUIT AGAINST FIFTEEN PEOPLE

Glenn O. Powers has filed suit in the circuit court against D. L. Keyt, John Roland Ragdale, Joseph Ragdale, Charles H. Jordan, Peter Hanson, C. W. Hanson, O. M. Carlson, John M. Renne, Henry O. Shanafelt, B. A. Washburne, C. W. Washburne, Erick Johnson, W. J. Nesmith and the Chambers Hardware Company for various sums which, including costs and attorney's fees, will aggregate over \$3000 if granted, on account of money due for work and other things on a group of mining claims in the Bohemia mining district.

D. L. Keyt is sued for \$2298, and the other individuals for much smaller sums. This afternoon the same plaintiff filed a writ of attachment, through his attorneys, Williams & Bean, against the stamp mill of the Oregon Blue River Mining Company and the Illinois mining claim, belonging to the same corporation. The steam engine and boiler are not brought under the attachment, the rest of the machinery being included.
