will be a wedding, there is not much doubt. One is that it is solemnized in Italy difficult questions of rank and precedence would arise, whose solution would be well nigh impossible on any basis which should give offence neither to the sensibilities of the bride and her family nor to the rigid ceremonialists of the court.

JOSEPH LEITER, WHO IS TO WED AN ARMY BELLE.

Joseph Leiter, who is said to be engaged to Miss Juliette Williams of Washington, is one of the most widely known society men in the country. He is son of the late L. Z. Leiter and was born in Chicago in 1898. He was graduated from Harvard in 1921 and in 1925 was the hero of the most daring wheat deal ever known.
