

TORNADOES SWEEP OVER OKLAHOMA

Woodward, Okla., May 11.—A succession of tornadoes swept over the district lying 25 miles to the southwest, south and south-east of Woodward last night. Seven small, isolated villages, off the railroad and without telegraphic communication, are reported destroyed. Many are injured and several are reported killed.

The tornadoes covered four counties and traversed 75 miles.

The towns damaged include Grand, Arnett, Viel, Mutual, Estelle, Richmond, Colley, Little Robe, Cretos, and Nashville. Some of the towns mentioned are reported as practically wiped out and the others greatly damaged.
