FINE FARM OF GEORGE A. DORRIS NEAR SPRINGFIELD

Last Wednesday the editor of the News strolled across the hill south of Springfield and by chance visited the ranch of Geo. Dorris, which until recently had the distinction of being the banner hop ranch in the world. To our surprise Mr. Dorris has dug up his hop yard entirely and has converted his ranch into fruit and vegetable raising of a less common nature. The first asparagus bed that we have ever seen of any size we saw on this ranch. Mr. Dorris now has in different beds, over 25 acres, but at the present time he is only cutting about 12 acres, the other not being old enough. Off the 12 acres he is now getting from 700 to 1000 pounds daily, and finds a ready market at the very top price, it bringing him 10 cents a pound in Portland. Next year he expects to cut about 2000 pounds daily from his different beds. He also has 7 acres of strawberries that promise an enormous yield. His crops are so arranged that one harvest follows another, and as soon as the asparagus crop is out of the way, which lasts through April and May, the berries are ready to pick. Then comes his cherries of which he has 20 acres. After this crop is off the peaches are next, of which he has about 25 acres. Then comes his grape harvest, followed by a 25 acre crop of walnuts. Mr. Dorris has his different crops arranged so that one follows the other with a short interval between, just long enough to get in readiness. His is a typical ranch for diversified farming and is one of the largest for its size in Lane county. Mr. Dorris is now having in his employ fifteen men. When his fruit comes on it will require much more help to take care of it. The crops are so arranged that he will have a harvest on eight months in the year and the products of each crop will find a ready market in Portland and Seattle.—Springfield News.

PETITION FOR PAVEMENT OF MORE STREETS

A petition will be presented to the city council tonight for the paving of Olive street from Fifth to Tenth streets. It is said that a majority of the property owners adjoining the street have attached their signatures and that the contract is practically assured. A remonstrance, it is said, will be filed soon against the improvement. Olive street is already a business street of consequence, and with the pavement may become a second Willamette. A petition is also being circulated for the pavement of Ninth street between Olive and Lincoln. This may also be brought up tonight.

STREET RAILWAY HAS VERY EXACT SCHEDULE

The street cars in Eugene run on a regular schedule, which is as exact as railroad time. During the day, from 6:15 in the morning to 6 in the evening, each car makes a trip every thirty minutes, or a fifteen-minute schedule between the depot and the University. The cemetery car leaves the barn at 6:15 in the morning, and then comes to the depot, running back to Fairmount, after which it takes its regular run to the Gross addition. The latest time it leaves the cemetery is 5:45 in the afternoon. The Fairmount car leaves the barn at 6:30 a. m., and makes its regular schedule of thirty minutes the round trip until 11 o'clock in the evening. In the morning the depot car, the one which meets all trains, the same as a bus, goes down from Fairmount at 5:30, in order to accommodate all passengers wishing to take the Cottage Grove local. The depot car will also carry passengers from the trains to the end of the line, as well as to the hotels. The management of the company also wishes to reiterate for the benefit of the public that the cars always stop on the opposite side of the street from which it is coming, and that passengers should always get on the back platform. Patrons who get on and off the cars with the greatest rapidity are also shown the most courtesy.
