Headquarters Oregon National Guard, Adjutant-General's Office, Portland, Oregon, May 9.—Circular No. 1.—The near approach of Memorial Day with its sacred memories reminds us that amid the turmoil of strife and rapid progress of events that we wait for a space and pay our tribute of love and duty to the fallen comrades and to the graves with sweet flowers as a token of their unselfish patriotism, heroic bravery and devotion to their country's cause. It is befitting that we should observe May 30 and help strew the graves of the departed heroes with flowers and show to the living that the brave deeds of those who fought in the Indian wars, the civil war and the Spanish-American war must not be forgotten.

"It is desired that the day be fittingly observed by the members of the Oregon National Guard. Where it is not practical for militia companies to participate in the ceremonies of the day it is requested that officers and men shall take part as individuals."

BAD FIRE AT GRASS VALLEY, OR.

Grass Valley, Or., May 12.—At midnight last night fire broke out in the general drygoods store of E. E. Porter & Company. Before the fire department and citizens arrived the fire was beyond control. One complete business block on the west side of the street, except W. F. Welgand & Company's store, was burned. The heat broke nearly all the glass out of the stores across the street.
Losses were as follows: E. E. Porter & Company's dry goods store, loss \$17,000, insurance \$10,000; A. J. Lemon's grocery, loss \$5,000, insurance \$3,000; P. N. Lemon's meat market, loss \$2,000, insurance \$750; J. H. Smith, loss \$500, no insurance; W. H. W. Wilcox, postoffice and confectionery, loss \$1,500, insurance \$1,250; M. B. Taylor's drug store, loss \$4,000, insurance \$2,150. The total loss of all the firms was \$30,000, with \$17,000 insurance. All the buildings that burned were frame, and nothing was saved except from the postoffice building. The United States mail was saved.

San Francisco, May 11.—James L. Gallagher, chairman of the finance committee and leading member of the Schmitz Board of Supervisors, had another trying day on the stand in the trial of Abe Ruef, for whom he confessed to having acted as agent in the various bribery transactions. It was Gallagher's third day on the stand and he was under cross-examination, re-direct and re-cross-examination during the day, counsel for the defense finally getting through with him at 6 o'clock.

Gallagher, while at times confused and tangled up by the rapid fire of questions of Henry Ach, chief counsel for Ruef, and vague and indefinite as to time and places of conversations, doggedly stuck to his story that Ruef instructed him to inform the other Supervisors that each member of the board would receive \$750 to pass the Parkside trolley franchise. Ruef previously having told him "to hold up" the Parkside people's application until he "could see about it."

Ruef's trial is now in its sixth week and in order to hasten its conclusion, Judge Maurice T. Doollitt will hold night sessions all this week.
