## BLACK HAND AFTER THE RICHEST WOMAN

New York, May 13.—Reports which those responsible for them assert are authentic are to the effect that Mrs. Betty Green, who is occupying apartments at the Plaza Hotel, recently received a Black Hand letter threatening her with death unless she gave \$5000 to the writer. Since the receipt of the letter Mrs. Green, in leaving the hotel for her office in the Chemical Bank building, has been accompanied by a detective. Formerly she was in the habit of leaving alone. The threat has had the effect of causing the hotel detectives to pay particular attention to Mrs. Green while she is in the building. Mrs. Green, it is said, has personally given the letter slight consideration, but her guardians at the hotel, it is said, have insisted upon her taking extra precautions for her safety.

The letter advised Mrs. Green to be in readiness to pay \$5000 to a messenger who would call to see her, and that she would be wise if she maintained secrecy.

## RAYNER DISCOVERS AMERICAN DREYFUS

Washington, May 13.—Senator Rayner, of Maryland, today spoke in the senate on his resolution directing the appointment of a committee to investigate charges against Colonel William F. Stewart, of the Coast Artillery, now stationed at Fort Grant, Ariz., by order of the president. Saying a communication had been sent to Colonel Stewart informing him that improvements would be made in the sanitary condition of Fort Grant if desired, Rayner added: "The same sort of communication passed to Dreyfus, I think. The charges against Colonel Stewart," said Rayner, "are frivolous and petty and do not in the slightest degree reflect upon his character as a man, his character as a citizen, or his courage as a soldier. One of them is that he has temperamental infirmities."

## BONDS VOTED BY SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, May 13.—Citizens generally are enthusiastic over the results of the bond election. The vote was 10 to 1 for the bonds. The first step to be taken by the supervisors will be to estimate the cost of the improvements made possible by the sale of the bonds, and the amount of money to be expended. Possibly by the middle of August work will begin on the projects which are to make San Francisco a larger and more beautiful city than ever.

For an auxiliary fire system and lands necessary for it, bonds amounting to \$5,200,000 were approved.

For a city sewer system, \$4,000,000.

For school buildings and lands for ample sites, \$5,900,000.

For public hospitals and necessary lands, \$2,000,000.

For a new city hall and county jail, \$1,000,000.

For a suitable garbage system and crematory, \$1,000,000.

## NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city engineer in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To reincorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1908, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Madock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
