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University of Oregon News

Next week there will occur the greatest athletic festival of the spring at the University. On Friday the O. A. C.-Oregon track meet comes off on Kincaid field for the championship of the Northwest. On Saturday two fast games of baseball between O. A. C. and the Oregon baseball teams, one in the morning and one in the afternoon, will be played. In addition to this, Friday morning the students will celebrate University Day by working on the campus and on Skinner's Butte. On Saturday will be held Junior week exercises. Friday night the Junior exhibition will be held in Willard hall, and on Saturday night the Junior Prom in the armory.

Oregon beat O. A. C. at track in the Columbia meet last month, but the Aggie are not satisfied with that and expect to put up a close contest. The meet will be more exciting than usual. Oregon has a fine lot of distance runners, the events in which O. A. C. has always been strong, and some pretty races will be run between the rivals.

The baseball situation is also equally as acute. Both the Oregon and Agricultural College teams are winning games, and the amateur collegiate championship of the state, which the Northwest lies between the two colleges. The playing of two games in one day is an innovation. The work for University day, is divided into three sections. The building of bleachers on the north side of Kincaid field to hold eight hundred people, the building of cement sidewalks west of Deady hall, and the building of a big cement "O" on Skinner's Butte. The materials for the "O" will be furnished by the Commercial club.

The Junior Prom on Saturday night will be the chief social event before commencement. Guests will probably be present from Corvallis and other towns.

Whitman Track Meet. In the track meet with Whitman last Wednesday afternoon, McIntire, who has been putting the shot well over forty feet, did not get a place, though the distance that took first was only three inches beyond the forty mark. Neither he nor Zacharias threw the discus one hundred feet, though a number of men in college can do that well who are twenty pounds lighter. Tomorrow in the Washington State meet, these men are likely to get their places in those events.

Debate Postponed. The championship debate between the Lebanon and Astoria high schools has been postponed until May 29. The question is the matter of proportional representation. The contest will be held in Willard hall.

Summer School. A bulletin has been issued announcing the summer school to extend from the end of commencement until the middle of August. Two courses will be offered in biology by Professor Sweetser and Miss Kent, two courses in chemistry by Prof. Shinn, two courses in education by Prof. Sheldon, two courses in English literature by Prof. Howe and Miss Willama, two elementary courses in French and Spanish, respectively, by Prof. Chioran, four courses in German by Prof. Schmidt, three courses in history by Prof. Clark, four courses in mathematics by Prof. DeCou, four courses in physics by Prof. Boynton and Mr. Jackson.

The work is primarily for teachers, though many other students attend.

Registration. According to the University catalogue recently issued, there are enrolled in every department of the University, including those at Portland, 838 instructors and students. The total number of students is 714. In the college of literature and science are 204, in the college of engineering 195, in the school of law 98 and the School of Medicine, 88. The School of Music has 142 registered. The School of Law and Medicine are located at Portland.

University Notes. The freshman team representing the Philonian debating society beat the freshmen of the Laurean team last Saturday night by a two to one decision on the question that the United States should adopt a system of shipping subsidies.

Proceeding the debate Professor Howe, spoke on the Referendum of the University funds.

Salem, Or., May 14.—Chief of Police Gibson last night made a trip of inspection of the saloons of the city to see whether they were complying with the new ordinance. The chief found that they were all complying with the exception of one State street saloonman, who had entailed up in front of his place. The chief ordered him to remove them, and they came down. Today the chief will ask the license committee of the council to accompany him on a trip to all the saloons to see that they are complying with the law prohibiting back rooms. Some of the saloonmen insist that the new law permits them to keep back rooms if they keep the doors locked. The matter will undoubtedly be settled tomorrow. The police will enforce the law strictly.

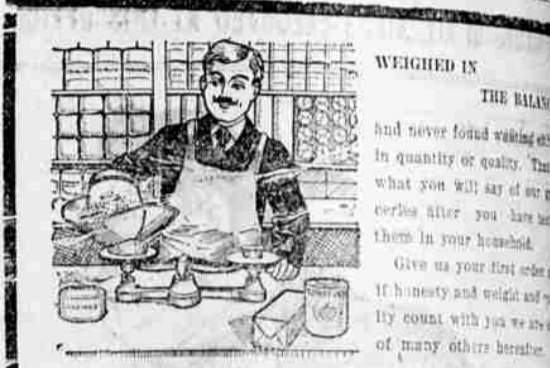
