COTTAGE GROVE WANTS TO FORM NEW COUNTY

LEADER ADVOCATES CUTTING SLICE OFF LANE AND DOUGLAS —SAYS BOHEMIA MINERS AND SOUTHERN LANE LUMBERMEN ARE IN FAVOR OF IT—LORANE ALSO

The Cottage Grove Leader of this week advocates the creating of a new county out of the southern portion of Lane and the northern portion of Douglas. The Leader in an editorial says:

With the extensive improvements and developments in the Bohemia district, which is situated in both Lane and Douglas counties, the establishment of great saw milling and lumber plants in southern Lane and northern Douglas, makes a crying demand for a change in the county boundary line so as to include the immense natural resources and growing industries of this section in one and the same county. In order to overcome the many difficulties arising in securing titles, making correct filings and entries, as well as public road and other improvements.

Both Roseburg and Eugene, the present county seats of these respective counties, which embrace an area greater than that of several of the New England states, are situated so far from this section of both counties as to render it inconvenient and expensive for our people to visit these places continually for the transaction of legal and county business. The time is therefore at hand when a good sized slice should be carved from both of these counties and a new county formed. The people of the Lorane and coast section favor such a scheme. The Bohemia miners are enthusiastic for it. The Pass creek timber and mill men are hoisting for it—in fact, there is not a citizen in southern Lane or northern Douglas but can see the great necessity for such a movement, owing to the peculiar topography and grouping of resources and industries embraced within this proposed new county, which would still leave Lane and Douglas counties with large territory, rich in resources, and their county seat towns centrally located.

The Leader thinks the time opportune for a concerted movement toward the formation of a new county from southern Lane and northern Douglas, on the part of the Cottage Grove Commercial Club, and the people of this favored section of these two counties. Let us get busy and bring this matter to a vote of the people at the election two years hence.

GOULD ROADS TO ISSUE MORE BONDS.

New York, May 14.—The Tribune tomorrow will say:

An important further step was reported today in the working out of the plans for financing the roads of the Gould system. The Denver & Rio Grande Railway Company, it is learned from trustworthy sources, is about to create a mortgage securing an issue of \$150,000,000 bonds, authorization for which will be asked from the stockholders at a special meeting to be held within a few weeks.

The bonds are expected to be 5 per cent and will run 50 years. Of the proposed \$150,000,000 for refunding the outstanding bonded obligations of the company, the remaining \$60,000,000 being available for future use in the development of the property and for other purposes.
