## ADVERSE REPORT ON O. & C. LAND GRANT BILL

Washington, D. C., May 15.—The house public lands committee today voted to have no further legislation in relation to the Oregon and California land grant. Mendell's resolution, which proposed to direct the Attorney-General to permit present holders of lands to continue in their use and occupancy during the pendency of suits, was adversely reported. This puts an end to this matter so far as congress is concerned until it becomes necessary to determine what disposition shall be made of lands recovered by the government. In this connection attention is called to the fact that under the law no more forest reserves can be created in Oregon except by act of congress. All members of the Oregon delegation are opposed to placing any railroad lands in the forest reserve, and if the next delegation holds the same views, it is a safe prediction that lands recovered by the government will be disposed of only to actual settlers, either under the existing law or under some special act to be framed later.

## MAYFLOWER PROPERTY TO BE DEVELOPED

With this week another important mining property in Bohemia takes on development on a large scale, says the Cottage Grove Western Oregon. Sunday R. A. Vaughn and R. E. Grantham, mechanical engineer, of Portland, and J. A. Fastlanger, of Astoria, and T. L. Bourd, of Kelso, Washington, arrived in this city and left Monday morning over the Oregon & Southern, for the well-known Mayflower camp on Steamboat. W. P. Ely, the manager of the Mayflower, was expected to join the party here and was enroute from his home at Kelso, when he was advised of the death of a relative and hurried back to Portland. The party took seven miners from this place, and it is understood that active development work will commence soon. It is not known as yet what kind of a reduction plant will be installed, but it is said that this will be determined in the near future. The Mayflower property consists of several claims, of which many favorable comments have been made. As soon as Mr. Ely arrives more definite information of the plans of the company will be forthcoming.

## The American's Gambling Ways.

In a letter from "A German in America," published in a Berlin newspaper, the writer dwells at length on the "American's fondness for gambling and his proclivity in the art." "His business methods," says the writer, "are speculative and not conservative, like ours, and he takes great risks to reach the coveted goal of riches. At school he plays games with the small copper coin of the country, and when he reaches college he plays poker. He gambles on the outcome of the athletic contests in his and rival educational institutions, and when driven to the wall in argument, no matter what the subject may be, the final and usually effective weapon is a bet. From school he goes into business. If this happens to be in the financial line, there is no interruption of the gambling habits acquired at school. If he goes into commerce and can resist the temptations of the men who dangle before his eyes visions of fortunes made by speculating in stocks, he may be saved. But usually he succumbs and is worse off than the financial gambler, because he becomes a speculator in his own business and in the stock market also. It must be a dreadful strain on the men, but they seem to thrive on it and to grow fat and rich as well, and only we who worry about them remain poor."

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city. That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids. That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Marlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
