ALBANY COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL WELCOME EUGENIANS--RATE OF ONE FARE FOR THE ROUND TRIP SECURED FROM SOUTHERN PACIFIC COMPANY IF A HUNDRED TICKETS ARE SOLD

The Commercial Club has received a communication from the manager of the Albany Commercial Club, stating that the club there will gladly welcome the Eugene boosters on their excursion to that city on the evening of May 26.
