## BOHEMIA MINERS PEGGING STEADILY ON THEIR CLAIMS

Mineral, Oregon, May 14.—The Bohemia mines are quite active and one can hear blasting on every hand. There is some snow on the highest points, but not enough to hinder extensive operations. Wagon roads, trails and houses are being built and improved, while underground operations continue unabated.

John Brund is building four miles of wagon road, extending from the Vesuvius Mill to some mines owned by F. J. Hard, who is manager of the Vesuvius property. This is Mr. Hard's Utopian group, and he will commence hauling ore to the mill as soon as the wagon road is completed. He has made arrangements with the Vesuvius people for the use of their mill. Mr. Hard milled 50 tons of this ore last season, and it gave such satisfactory results that he has decided to put on ore wagons and has gone to heavy expense in building the road.

In coming up the Sharps Creek road from Cottage Grove, one looks at a sign at Martin Creek which says, "Two Miles to Combination Mine." This property is said to be rich in silver and gold and one that will soon be on a paying basis. Clark Bros., owners, have done some extensive development since they took over the property two years ago. They have a small sawmill to cut their mining timbers. In going into the mine, one is struck with the up-to-date method of timbering which the owners have adopted, namely, the square set. They have various drifts and crosscuts and in a three levels have 1500 feet of tunnel, which work has exposed ore bodies of sufficient size to warrant installation of a mill. The mill to be erected will be of the wild type of concentrator, mill and true vanners. They have enough ore in sight to supply a ten-ton mill for a considerable length of time.

Two miles further on the trail is the property of the Martin Creek Mining Company, operated by Colonel W. H. Burghardt, of Salem. At this property is a large bunkhouse, tunnel houses and several tunnels. Mr. Burghardt has exposed some fine ore in some of these tunnels.

The Star property is not being operated at present and the mill is idle, but it is thought operations will be resumed shortly.

The Twin Rocks Mining Company property, over the range in Douglas County, is being developed as fast as men can do the work. A crosscut, which is not 200 feet, is being rapidly driven and will soon cut a ledge of proven riches.

M. H. Shane is doing development work on his Pittsburg property, at the head of Rock Creek. He has some very nice ore exposed and has been at the property most of the winter.

The newly organized Trinity Mining Company has taken over all property in Bohemia owned by the Great Eastern mine and will soon commence operations on all the property.

## OREGON WON BY CLOSE SCORE AT PULLMAN

Pullman, Wash., May 16.—Oregon defeated Washington State College in a dual track meet here today by the close score of 52 to 50. Features of this meet were Houston's record of 10 seconds in the 100-yard dash; fast work by Roberts, an Oregon freshman, in the 220-yard dash; a splendid broad jump by Captain Kuykendall, of Oregon, and the consistent performances of Johnson, Cool and Clark, the distance runners on the Washington State College team.

Downs, Selvers and Dodson, Oregon's distance runners, showed the effect of their grueling work in the Oregon-Whitman meet and were not in the best of condition for today's events. Moulten's failure to win the pole vault and the inability of Zacharias to capture the hammer-throw for Oregon gave the local athletes points that they did not count on. Oregon Forfeits Relay.

All the Oregon men showed the effects of their long trip, although the sprinters and hurdlers did excellent work. Oregon seemed to have a run of bad luck in a number of the events, but managed to win out by an actual score of 52 to 50. Pullman's remaining 5 points were scored by Oregon's forfeit relay of the relay race. Oregon has a splendid team of gentlemen and sportsmen. Trainer Hayward is recognized by local athletic authorities as one of the greatest coaches in the west.

The Oregon men will meet the team of the Oregon Agricultural College in Eugene next Friday, and, if victorious, will claim the Northwest championship.

## SMITHSON BREAKS WORLD'S RECORD IN 100-YARD HURDLES

Forrest Smithson is at his old tricks again, lowering the world's record in the hurdles. At the Athletic League's field day for the sailors in San Francisco Wednesday he set a new mark in the 100-yard low hurdles. Smithson ran over eight low sticks in 12 seconds flat. The former record was held by Krantzen in 12 2-5 seconds. Smithson was on the program as a special feature.

The hurdles were set up on the bicycle track at the Stadium. A slight wind was at the Portland boy's back, and it is possible that the record will not be allowed him.
