CO-OPERATION TO SECURE A PACIFIC FLEET

EUGENE COMMERCIAL CLUB URGED TO TAKE MATTER OF INCREASED DOCKING FACILITIES UP WITH REPRESENTATIVES IN CONGRESS FROM THIS STATE

The following letter has been received by the Eugene Commercial Club. It is self-explanatory: San Francisco, May 11, 1908. Mr. L. L. Whitson, President, Mr. John H. Hartog, Manager, Eugene Commercial Club, Eugene, Oregon.

Gentlemen:—There is nothing like co-operation. This was never more forcibly illustrated than in the presentation of the memorial to the secretary of the navy, the Honorable Victor H. Metcalf, on the occasion of a breakfast tendered to him by the California promotion committee at the Hotel St. Francis, San Francisco, Wednesday morning, May 6th.

Commercial bodies from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, California, Utah, Arizona, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands signed the petition asking that an adequate fleet of naval vessels remain permanently in Pacific waters.

The secretary for obvious reasons was unwilling to state anything definite at the present time, for, as he said, this is a matter of government policy. He announced, however, that he would present the memorial to the president on his return to Washington, and take up the matter with him personally and in detail.

It is believed that this action, in which your organization has joined, has made a deep impression with the administration, and that sooner or later the suggestion and request will be complied with.

I wish to call your attention to one very important matter, and that is the necessity for greater facilities for the docking and general repair and construction work on war vessels at the different Pacific ports. The facilities at present are altogether inadequate, and should be increased without any delay.

Thanking you for your co-operation and assuring you of the desire of the committee to co-operate with you at any and all times, I am, generally yours, RALPH P. JENNINGS, Chairman California Promotion Committee.

POSTAL CARD CAMPAIGN BEGINS AT UNIVERSITY

The postal card campaign has begun by the University students in the University of Oregon appropriation battle, which closes at election day, June 1st. Each student is given a couple of dozen postal cards, which he addresses, and to which he signs his name.

On the back of the card a number of interesting facts are given, the most important of which, perhaps is the increase in taxation. The University bill, if passed, will increase the taxes on \$1,000 only 2-10 cents or 10-12 cents on \$5,000.

The Linn County Grange is the only organization in the state opposing the University bill.

YALE DEFEATS HARVARD IN DUAL TRACK MEET.

Cambridge, Mass., May 16.—Speed and strength in track events led Yale to defeat Harvard in the annual meet today by a score of 60 1-5 to 43 4-5 points. The victory also gave Yale permanent possession of the trophy offered in 1901, the Blue having defeated Harvard since that time on five occasions.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To reincorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Madock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
